

DEATH OF MRS. HAY, ONE OF OUR PIONEERS

Died at the Family Home
Last Friday.

WAS A WOMAN BELOVED BY ALL
Large Concourse Attended Funeral
Services Sunday.

Mrs. Rebecca Schofield Hay, wife of William Hay, died at the family home, one mile southeast of this place, Friday morning, March 1, from an attack of la grippe. Deceased was born in Clark county, Illinois, April 2, 1847, emigrated to California in 1851, and came to Oregon in 1859. She was married to William Hay October 22, 1863. A husband and five children survive her—Frank Hay, who is connected with the Pullman service of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company; John, a business man of Tacoma, and well known to Portland commercial men; Benjamin, who resides at the family homestead; Mrs. Harriet Imbrie, wife of Frank Imbrie, now of Portland, and Miss Sadie, of this place.

Mrs. Hay resided in Washington county since coming to Oregon. She was a sister of Hon. John Schofield, late Justice of the Supreme Court. Of her immediate family, but one relative is alive, Hon. Benjamin Schofield, of Forest Grove.

The funeral took place from the family residence Sunday afternoon, and interment was in the Masonic cemetery. The attendance at the funeral was the largest at a like ceremony in Hillsboro for many years, a tribute to the general esteem in which the departed woman was held. The floral tributes were beautiful and profuse.

ANNUAL SCHOOL ELECTION MONDAY

Statement of the Hillsboro
District Receipts.

WHERE THE MONEY IS SPENT

S. B. Huston Elected Director for
Three Years and Peter Boscow Clerk.

At the annual school meeting in this city Monday Hon. S. B. Huston was elected director for three years and Peter Boscow was elected to serve one year as clerk. The clerk's report showed that there were 457 minors drawing school money for the year just closed. Twelve teachers have been employed, two of whom are males. The receipts for the year were \$4,927.52 and the expenditures were \$5,187.39, of which \$3,091.86 was for salaries and the balance for incidentals, payment on bonded debt, etc. The school building, grounds and school apparatus are valued at \$14,000.

The Cornelius school district elected the following: J. C. Buchanan, director for three years; A. A. Phillips, clerk.

Forest Grove school district elected the following: S. T. Walker, director for three years; W. S. Hudson, clerk, succeeding himself. The clerk's report showed total receipts for the year to be \$3,200.16 and disbursements \$2,143.26. The district's bonded debt is \$4,500 and the warrant debt, Feb. 15, \$275.

THAT PROPOSED RAILROAD.

GLENCOE, Ore., March 4, 1901.—(To the Editor) I was in Portland the other day and while there had a conversation with Wm. Reid, the railroad man who originally started the Astoria & South Coast railroad. That gentleman informed me that in all probability the proposed road to the Nehalem would go through Glencoe, and most likely through the Cornelius Pass country, thence through this place. This route will require a tunnel, which, of course, is expensive, but the matter of nine miles of road more required on the South Tualatin route will make that line cost fully as much, to say nothing of the cost of keeping up the extra road and the building of a bridge across the Willamette. The route to Glencoe would give terminal facilities at the Union depot, and give Portland our trade just as well as the South Tualatin route. Mr. Reid stated that an engineer would be here from New York in a very few days and take hold of the survey preliminaries. Glencoe has a world of freight to ship, and a road through this section is needed perhaps worse than any other section in the county. The line will receive hearty support from Glencoe people.

M'HARGUE TROUBLE.

The Reedville school district trouble seems to be increasing, rather than diminishing. This is the district where the teacher, U. S. McHargue, was some months ago brought before Referee C. E. Runyon on a charge of immoral and unprofessional conduct. The State Board of Education revoked McHargue's certificate, but his papers had expired at the time of revocation. McHargue still remains at the seat of war, and neighbor is arrayed against neighbor as the result, the few extending even into individual families. At the annual school meeting Monday there was a great deal of trouble, and adjournment was voted before the business of the day was transacted. A director, James Rasmussen, was elected, but it is stated that a new call has been issued by the board for another meeting. No clerk was elected. Deputy Sheriff Bradford was present at the meeting to see that no violence was done.

McHargue may think he is in the right, but it is quite certain that his staying in the district is ill-advised, as it is causing much bitterness. These ructions are bad for a community, and it is discouraging for the district. On both sides of the controversy are good, well meaning citizens, and the friction is bad on the school affairs of the district.

Washington county has purchased two new improved rock crushers from the Austin & Western Company, and for the two has paid \$2400. By taking two machines the county made a discount of \$200. The crushers are mounted on wheels and have elevators to load wagons. These crushers are the best on the market. One will be placed in the east end of the county, along the line of the Portland mountain, and the other will be kept in the west end. The crusher at the Grove will be repaired and can be used, although it is small.
