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Opposed to Gold Mono-metallism. Believes in the Bimetallic Standard. Dear Money means Debased Property, and Profitless American Property. Our Consequent loss is our Creditors' Gain. Has no use for Marcus A. Hanna.

INDIAN WAR VETERANS

Oregon spent a couple of thousand dollars in sending T. A. Wood back to Washington to use his influence in getting pension legislation for the Indian War Veterans. Wood always works the Indian War Veteran graft in one guise or another. Every biennial campaign he is on the turf for his influence and the way circulars begin to roll to the little remnant of veterans left out of the hardy old fighters is a caution. It never does any good, and votes are thrown away as far as action is concerned. Now the state has thrown away some money on the proposition. If Oregon had a proper sense of patriotism it would have long since pensioned these old fighters. As for taxation, every one could get a modest pension, even if it had to be done at the risk of shutting off the thousand and one grafts that are now worked. The Argus has frequently stated that the general government would do nothing for these veterans, until, at least, it saw that the people of the Northwest meant business.

REVOLVING, BUT A MORAL.

The revolting trial just ended at the court house should be a lesson to those who look upon morals as a sort of football. The defendant assuredly got his just deserts, or will get them when he is paying out his sentence, while the foolish girl who "wanted to go out and rout" a professional and self-advertised libertine met just what foolish females generally meet when they recklessly start out with that kind of cattle. Here is a lesson in this case. Let boasting males hold their tongues; while foolish females who imagine they can go out on the streets and battle lust must expect results that breed lifelong shame. The "pen" oftentimes awaits the male, and stinging obloquy the female.

ST. PATRICK AS A "WORLD-POWER."

In the St. Patrick's Day speeches Monday night reference was made to the fact that while the Irish people in Ireland have decreased in number since the beginning of the last century, they have, taking the world over, increased perhaps faster than any other.

Exact figures are not available on the subject, but interesting estimates have been made. The census of Ireland taken in 1821 showed her population then 5,801,827. At the census of 1841 it reached its high-water mark for the nineteenth century—8,175,124. When the census of 1851 was taken the great famine and the consequent emigration had done their work, and Ireland's population fell to 6,592,385. The stream of emigration from the Green Isle has flowed constantly, though with varying volume, ever since, and at the last census (1891) its population had fallen to 4,704,750. Speaking roundly, the Irish people at home have decreased nearly 50 per cent in the past sixty years.

But this is only one side of the story. The census of 1890 showed nearly 2,000,000 persons living in the United States alone who were born in Ireland. The late John Boyle O'Reilly used to speak of 10,000,000 of American people of Irish birth and descent, and the estimate is probably not far out of the way. If, as it has been said, there are 5,000,000 more people of Irish birth or descent living in Canada, Australia and the other British colonies, we have a total of nearly 20,000,000 instead of the 8,000,000 living in Ireland in 1841. And this leaves out of the reckoning the large Irish population of England itself, where no less than twenty-three Parliamentary seats

are controlled by Irish voters. Altogether St. Patrick's fame has gained greatly in "world-power" by the wide dispersion of his sons and daughters.—N. Y. World.

STUDY THIS SITUATION.

To those apathetic citizens who imagine that we are all powerful as a government, and that we are the people, etc., and that commercialism has nothing to do with this government, it will be well to note that J. Pierpont Morgan & Co., embracing his own firm and the backing of the Rockefeller and Rothschilds, representing a capitalization of three thousand and four millions of wealth, is now in business. This company owns and operates our great railway and steamship lines, our great coal mines, our steel manufactures, etc., and here is where our nation is in danger. This great corporation has a cinch on federal affairs, and in a recent number of the Cosmopolitan, John Brisbane Walker says: "Of what consequence the German playing at emperor, or the king who recently read a speech written by ministers under dictation from the world of finance? Even the czar of Russia seems a feeble make-believe in the presence of men who control three thousand millions of dollars and can push the endless buttons which carry their signals into every sort of mercantile house, into every military camp, which causes court officials to stand alert, and can even produce the profoundest movement in the church itself."

How are we to get the canal between the two hemispheres? With this great corporation naturally against it as a business proposition, and with its natural influence with the party in power, whether we are drifting? "We shall not get the ship subsidy bill." Why not? The canal will not be built, and the ship measure will go through if this company shall have its say. Does the enormity of this great question startle the average citizen? Not at all. He does not seem to realize that the administration is in sympathy with this all powerful influence and does not seem to appreciate the appreciate the fact that this combination never would have effected unless its promoters had every assurance from Mr. Hanna and his servants that their way should be the administration's way. Here is a grave question, and one that effects the very marrow of the nation. Is there any citizen so blind that he can not see now danger in this great coalition of government and capital? If so, who is he, and where does he reside?

AGUINALDO has been caught again—according to the dispatches from the Philippines. Funston is now credited with the capture. But as Aguinaldo is experienced in this line, and has been killed a dozen times it probably will not hurt his feelings to be captured.

Why should there be any prejudice against Mr. McKinley having a third term? Is there any sense in objecting to a third term, so long as he satisfies those who place him there? If the corporations are satisfied, inasmuch as he is their idea of a president, who should object to four terms by the same man? Particularly, let no man who voted for him, nor journals which supported him, object to the third term idea.

Governor Geer is going to give the President a warm welcome when he comes to Oregon. This is very kind in the Governor, and THE ARGUS would suggest that Geer make Hi Plummer an aide for the day. Oregon is governed by a political mountebank, but it appears that he can sell all the offices that are "upto-him" and yet stand in with the powers that be.

"Benevolent assimilation" is getting on famously in the Philippines. Not only have the dead bodies of some 30,000 natives been assimilated with the soil which they so foolishly died to make free, but those who have submitted to "criminal aggression" are to enjoy all the blessings of carpet-bag rule of the genuine Ohio brand. The obtuse inhabitants who stand out are to be treated to the reconcentralo policy employed by Gen. Weyler, our patron saint for the new possessions. Duty and destiny are thus being fulfilled.—N. Y. World.

The late Benjamin Harrison is being eulogized by many democratic papers for his position on the imperial question. Mr. Harrison was certainly much opposed to imperialism, but it will be remembered that last fall he knew and understood just as much of the republican policy as outlined and directed by Mr. Hanna and his conferees as he did subsequent to the election. No one questions his ability to have understood this great question, but the fact remains that he practically supported it, and had he lived until another presidential election he would have been just as eager in his support of Haunism as he had been in the now past.
