

NATIVE SONS' STREET
CARNIVAL IN OCTOBEROver One Thousand Dollars
Already Raised.

BEST STREET FAIR IN THE STATE

Features will be Novel and Interesting
—League Ball Game.

The Native Sons have selected October 2, 3, 4 and 5 as the date for their carnival, and the committee is working hard to complete all arrangements for a big entertainment. The finance committee have raised nearly \$1000 and expect about four or five hundred more. The generous support the Natives are receiving, not only in Washington county, but in Portland and elsewhere, indicates that this carnival will be one of the best ever held in Oregon.

Booths for exhibits and sales stands will be constructed on Second and on Main streets and decorative arches placed where they will do the most good.

Everything in the way of entertainment that can be had will be secured. The intentions of the management is to give preference to that class of amusements that a large crowd can view, and to that end they will endeavor to have big parades, exciting races and athletic contests.

The program of entertainment in its infancy as yet, but if the present plans are not upset, every day will be full of interest, both to lovers of sport and to those who are interested in the resources of Washington county.

It is expected that there will be a Fireman's Tournament with contests of speed with the hose carts and a tug of war between the rival teams, using a regulation fire hose instead of a rope.

Cash prizes will be given for bicycle and foot races, and several are already in training for entry. Negotiations are pending relative to preparing a first-class athletic and base ball field and it is likely that the two leading base ball teams of the Northwest League will be secured for one or two games during the carnival. Base ball will be at fever heat by that time, so this should prove a drawing card.

Numerous applications for permits are received every day. There will be many exhibits, not only from without the county, but also from beyond the state line. A number of manufacturers have signified their intentions of preparing an exhibit for the carnival.

Letters have also been received from people inquiring whether or not that would be a good time to buy stock. Parties having stock to sell should remember this and have their offers on hand. If it is desired, an auctioneer will be furnished, or you may dispose at private sale.

In all probability, the last day will be devoted largely to horse racing. There are already on the schedule a hurdle race, steeple chase, quarter-mile dash for ladies and a half-mile dash. Hurdle racing is the reigning fad now and several of the Portland Hunt Club riders are desirous of participating in the races. This will make the events all the more interesting, as it is a notable fact that Washington county's only entry in their races has never failed to secure either first or second place.

Mr. Heidel and others are working hard for the Washington county exhibit at the state fair, and that, with other individual exhibits of our resources, will be shown here. Cash prizes and diplomas will be given to exhibitors.

Afternoon amusements will consist of baseball, races of all kinds, target shooting, tug-of-war, etc. A good merry-go-round will be on the ground. Refreshments of all kinds.

OREGON GRAND ARMY
ELECTS OFFICERSState Encampment a Great
Success.

WEATHER BAD BUT GOOD PROGRAM

Pythian Day was Splendidly Attended.
—Grand Officers Present.

Forest Grove, Or., June 26.—At the annual meeting of the G. A. R. of Oregon, held this afternoon, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

Butcher, of Eugene; and Isaac Taylor, of Cottage Grove; delegates to the National encampment, to be held at Cleveland, O., in September, H. S. Allen, B. B. Pike and Jacob Dockenbach; alternates, H. E. Doebe, Israel Putnam and W. H. Lincoln. The 21st annual encampment will be held at Astoria. Commander-in-chief Rasseau, of the G. A. R., will arrive here tomorrow from St. Louis.

Patrick, of Grant's Pass, and Mrs. Millie Morris, of Portland; delegate-at-large to the National convention, at Cleveland, O., Mrs. Eunice Sargent, of Portland; alternate at large, Mrs. Maudie Kelly, of Heppner; delegate, Mrs. R. W. Wagner, of Hillsboro; alternate, Mrs. Henrietta Zoller, of Grant's Pass.

A large audience greeted the speakers at the campground of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. of Oregon, and the Washington County Veterans' Association last night. Professor James Rood Robertson, of Pacific University, greatly pleased the G. A. R. and W. R. C. by his patriotic speech. Following him Mrs. J. W. Spangler, of this place, and Mrs. Clara Lytle, of La Grande, the department president of the W. R. C., delivered interesting addresses. The former, on behalf of the Woman's Relief Corps, delivered an address of welcome, and the latter, in a neat speech, responded. A solo by Rev. J. C. Reed, of Dilley, and a selection by The Little Ladies' Band closed the exercises.

Pythian Day yesterday was a great event. Hundreds of Knights and Rathbones were in the parade. Grand Chancellor W. L. Bradshaw, of The Dalles, Grand Keeper of Records and Seals Stinson, of Salem, and Grand Master of Finance Sargent, of Portland, were present. Mayor F. T. Kane, a prominent Forest Grove Pythian, marshalled the K. of P. and Knight John McNamer was the grand marshal of the procession to its entirety. The parade formed down town at ten in the morning, and marched to the grounds. After dinner "Damon and Pythias" was listened to by three thousand people. The play was given in the open air, and the casts were creditably filled. In the evening over one hundred Knights repaired to the hall and heard the second and third ranks given by the Hillsboro team, conceded to be one of the best in the Northwest. The exercises were concluded by a banquet, and the visiting brothers thank the Veterans and Knights of Forest Grove for a red letter day in the history of Pythianism in this section. There were present visitors from all over the state. The McMinnville Knights were led in the parade by the McMinnville band; the Hillsboro, Glencoe and Cornelius Knights by the Hillsboro band, and the Forest Grove Knights by the Ladies' Band. The Rathbone Lodge, of this place, the only sister lodge in the county, was well represented.

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Albert Tozier, a well known Hillsboro boy of early day, and who is also well known to many people throughout Washington county, has been elected President of the National Editorial Association. He recently attended the National meeting at Buffalo, and his popularity amongst newspaper men won him the distinction. All Washington county naturally feel an interest in his honors. Many old timers here will remember Tozier as a boy. His father was one of our early sheriffs.

Cornelius Promises to Have
the Biggest Crowd.

WEST UNION AND BEAVERTON.

Everything Ready for a Grand Time
at These Places.

Independence Day will be duly celebrated in Washington county, and the places giving celebrations are preparing to have great doings. Cornelius will have the crowd, as it is centrally located, and has made the most extensive arrangements. The National salute of thirteen guns will be fired at sunrise, and then the festivities will begin. The Ladies' Band, of Forest Grove, will furnish the music. Mayor C. R. Buchanan will deliver the address of welcome, and Hon. H. V. Gates, of Hillsboro, and the Northwest, at large, will make the oration, and as he is an effective speaker he will give satisfaction and good measure. Miss Echo James, of Cornelius, will read the Declaration of Independence. A large chorus will furnish vocal music.

The horse races will be interesting, and there will be a trotting purse, three heats out of five, for \$35, a third of a mile running race with purse of \$10; a bicycle purse of \$10; foot races, fat man's race; tug-of-war; purses for all these contests, and a game of baseball—Cornelius against Washington county. There will be a fine dancing floor, and fireworks galore in the evening. The Cornelius string band will give a concert on the evening of the 2d. There is a fine grove at Cornelius, and camping grounds for all. The committee has made every arrangement for the comfort of their visitors, and a good time is guaranteed. Beaverton is to have a celebration, and her citizens promise a gay time. J. C. Sloan, of Portland, is to read the Declaration of Independence, and Hon. W. N. Barrett, of Hillsboro, is to deliver the oration. Mr. Barrett is a happy speaker, and his auditors will hear the National legend properly painted. The Hillsboro band will furnish the music. There will be all kinds of games and sports, a big parade, and a general good time.

MRS. RUTH GRIEST WARREN. Mrs. Ruth A. Warren, wife of Mr. E. H. Warren, who resides just east of this city, died Friday, June 21, at 1:15 p. m., after a two weeks' attack of pneumonia. The death was a shock, as Mrs. Warren was considered to have passed the dangerous stage of the attack. A relapse came Friday forenoon, and the patient grew gradually weaker. Death was almost painless, and the patient was resigned and cheerful to the last.

Ruth A. Griest was born in Le Roy, McLean Co., Illinois, Nov. 23, 1840. Her father, Elwood Griest, was a native of Maryland, born in 1818, and her mother, Mary Proctor Blount Griest, was born in 1819. Miss Griest was married to Mr. Warren, September 3, 1860. Four years later they emigrated to California, returning to Illinois four years later, and from there going to Missouri, where Mr. Warren was in business at Sedalia. In 1870 they came to Oregon, and have resided near Hillsboro ever since, with the exception of a few months spent in California from time to time, for the benefit of Mrs. Warren's health. Her husband and three daughters, Mrs. Zilpha Horner, Chico, Cal., Mrs. Zulu Linklater, wife of Dr. Linklater, Hillsboro, and Miss Minnie Warren, residing at home, survive.

Deceased leaves one sister and three brothers: Mrs. Sarah M. York, of Cozad, Neb.; O. E. Griest, Minneapolis, Kan.; Elwood D. Griest, Ambia, Ind.; and Lorin C. Griest, Clyde, Kan.

Since her fifteenth year Mrs. Warren had been a member of the M. E. church. She was a woman of high character and nobility of purpose. Her womanly qualities and purity of mind gathered to her many friends who sincerely mourn her demise. The remains were interred in the Masonic Cemetery, Sunday, Rev. H. Oberg officiating.
