McMinville Suffers Stinging Defeat.

THE BEST GAME OF THE SEASON

A Crack-a-Jack of a Game—Large Crowd Visit Old Yamhill.

For several weeks John W. Bailey, of the Pharmacy, has been interesting himself in baseball, and success crowned his efforts Sunday when his Hillsboro and vicinity nine went to McMinville and pulled the game away from the Yamhillers at a score of five to one. It was a great game, and the large crowd that went from here, Cornelius and Forest Grove, came home happy and jubilant. The team from here played almost faultless ball, and although Purdin, the big first baseman, made two errors at first, his stick work, which enabled some good scoring to follow, retrieved him and gave him plenty of honor. Ward Downs, the Hillsboro pitcher, played great ball. It was professional from start to finish, and he twirled the nine innings without a break in his delivery. But one man went to first on balls, Frank Sues, the catcher, froze to the sphere in great shape. Purdin did some good work on first, barring his errors. Briggs did some clever work on second, and Harry Cook held down third like a veteran.

The Hillsboro field was: Center, Hatch; right, McFee; left, Miller. Hatch did clever work, and McFee made the star sensational catch of the day, a one-hander, right down to the fence, a home run for McMinville had he muffed the ball. Don Hare, the shortest, played pretty ball all the way through.

Talk about your games! It was a game without parallel in the annals of the West Side field and the boys can repeat it! Roy Cook, of Cornelius, umpired the game and his decisions were satisfactorily received by all. And the way that Hillsboro, grand stand and bleachers, and Hillsboro and Cornelius were everywhere, made noise for the winners, was a caution. The old folks, the young folks, the kids and all, shouted and blew horns until pandemonium seemed to prevail.

The Congregational church at Forest Grove was burned, a total loss, last Friday night. The edifice was built, originally, in 1858, and had been renovated and rebuilt several times. It is said by some that the blaze was of incendiary origin, while others claim that the fire might have been caused by the crossing of electric light wires, or poorly insulated wires. The fire occurred after midnight, and it is reported that the fire hose, belonging to the church, was plugged. There are so many contradictory stories that it is hard to get at the facts. For some time there has been friction at Forest Grove between those who desire an open saloon and those who are against it. The radicals of the anti-saloon element allege that the fire was incendiary, and that some one of the element caused the fire to be set. On the other hand the element which wants open saloons is generally comprised of good citizenship, and they scoff at the idea. It is estimated that the building, as it stood, cost seven thousand dollars. Services have been held in the College Chapel since the fire.

# CIRCUIT COURT NOW IN SESSION

Important Decisions Affecting Justice Courts.

JOHN TOM McNAMARA'S CASE

Divorces Granted and Several Souls Made Happy.

Hon. Thomas A. McBride opened circuit court for the July term Monday morning. District Attorney Allen was present. Sheriff Sewell appointed J. T. Dorrien as bailiff for the term.

A Hinman was denied an injunction restraining the city of Forest Grove from giving E. W. Haines a contract for electric lights, so unless another move is made, the contractor will continue his services.

Judge McBride handed down a decision that bears on justice courts. He decided that a justice, under the law, is entitled to ten cents each for the six jurors generally sworn in justice court cases. He also held that where several witnesses' names were on one subpoena that but 25 cents could be collected from the county.

John Tom McNamara, who was indicted last spring for stealing a purse containing some small change and a ring from the central telephone office in this city, had his hearing Monday. At first arraignment he decided to go to trial Tuesday, but later in the day on Monday he thought better of it and went into court with a plea of guilty. Judge McBride gave him one year in the State penitentiary. Immediately thereafter a warrant was issued for Carl Larson, and he was taken to jail on the same charge. John Tom, in his statement, alleged that Larson helped him spend the money. John Tom, or "Bricktop," as he is more generally known, has been in trouble a great many times, but this is his first trip to the pen. He has served time in the county jail, and has also served time in the Multnomah jail.

W. E. Milam, indicted for murder in the case where the Chinaman was killed at Raleigh, last Fall, was released on his own recognizance and his trial was set for the first day of the November term. The state expects to prove that Milam was with Aiken at the time of the murder. It will be remembered that Aiken was convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary for life.
