WHAT IT COSTS TO KEEP OUR SCHOOLS

Some Interesting Facts About
Our Children.

EACH PUPIL LESS THAN \$8 YEARLY.

Teachers Employed for Year Ended,
202 Ninety-six School Houses.

One would hardly believe that it costs the taxpayers of the county less than \$8 annually to school each of the pupils of Washington county, but such is the case. From Superintendent Ball's annual report, tabulated, we learn the following facts about our county school system:

Total for school purposes, \$39,125.35. The report states that there are but two deaf mutes and two blind children in the county, a very good showing considering the population of the section. As there are 5,551 school children it will be seen that the annual expense of schooling is less than \$8 each, to be accurate, \$7.04 and 5 mills.

The annual teachers' institute will be held at Forest Grove next month, commencing August 25, and holding for five days.

Henry Vanderzanden.

Henry Vanderzanden, of near Verboort, died at his home, Tuesday evening, aged 65 years. Mr. Vanderzanden was injured last Spring by the falling of a barn. He suffered injuries of the spine from which he has had but little rest. At that time he broke his legs and received other injuries. His wife and several children survive him. Deceased was industrious and highly respected in his community.
