NEIGHBORS, DO NOT QUARREL.

It takes all kinds of people to make up a world. There are many creeds, religiously, and many codes of morality from which to choose. Anent the opposition to Sunday baseball playing in this, or any other city, THE ARGUS has but this to say: It believes in a man going to church on Sunday if he so desire; and believes in a person going to an innocent amusement on the same day, if he or she so desire. Provided, of course, that in all cases, no person or set of persons shall infringe upon the rights of others, lawfully, or unlawfully. As the Sunday newspaper and Sunday trains, that is a matter of opinion. THE ARGUS sees no wrong in a Sunday train service, and certainly sees no wrong in a Sunday newspaper. Either can be made instruments of good, and generally are made such instruments to many. The contention over the observance of the Sabbath day is as old as civilization itself, and the old blue laws of Connecticut gave us a touch of high life on this same score. Some will observe Sabbath by going to hear the Sunday sermon, sometimes of the gospel preached and sometimes of other things, while others go to innocent amusements and amusements that are not so innocent. That a minister of the gospel is expected to preach to his flock the strictest observance of the day of all days is a matter that no one disputes; and that many a deacon will occasionally go fishing on that day, or picnicking, in contravention to church discipline, is history from the dark ages down. These things have been so long threshed over that people make a mistake when they make too violent quarrel, one with the other, on the question that is no new settlement now than it was at the beginning of the Christian era.

A GREAT COLLEGE, YES.

An Eastern Oregon publication deprecates the fact that Oregon has no great colleges, and too many small, struggling institutions. As a matter of fact Oregon has a great college. It is located at Forest Grove and its benefits have reached every nook and corner of the Northwest. It is an institution of learning of which every Oregonian should feel proud. When a student has completed the course of study at Pacific University he is ready to enter the light any and everywhere. It has turned out more men of brains than any Western college. It gets no state support. Its standards are modern, and its instructors the best in the field of college work. Eastern Oregon realizes this and her sons and daughters are every year entering or leaving its study rooms. Let no Oregon newspaper say that we have no great college in the state, for such a statement is a libel on Oregon and the Northwest.

THE SCHLEY CONTROVERSY.

The long drawn controversy between Admiral Schley and the friends of Sampson, who are identical with Schley's critics, will be to an end this Fall. Schley has asked for an investigation of his actions and maneuvers while at Santiago, and a board of investigation has been selected. The request of the admiral for the inquiry has been forced by the critics who have sought in every way to belittle the actions of the brave old admiral, the latest being the literary efforts of a government clerk in the Navy Yard. Macoley, a writer of fiction which he calls history, asperses the actions and character of Schley, and calls him a coward. That the Secretary of the Navy is prejudiced against the admiral, and is heartily in accord with Sampson's admirers,

goes without saying. The Board of Investigation will no doubt, after hearing the evidence, give to Admiral Schley that credit which the nincompoop friends of the administration have been trying to rob him.

THERE is nothing wonderful in the fact that people, young and old, and regardless of sex, grow enthusiastic over a good, clean game of baseball. It is a game of National importance, and loved by admirers of physical contests everywhere, where contests are not brutal. The athletic field inaugurated in Hillsboro brings a new era to athletics in Washington county. The support given the new venture must be gratifying to the editor of the Independent, who was chairman of the first meeting called to consider the proposition of putting in a field of this kind.

ALL dispatches sent to Portland papers from this county in which it is alleged that the wheat crop will be short in yield do not hit the true situation in any respect. It is true that there is here and there a short yield as compared to the last several crops, but, generally, farmers, who are observant, and those who watch crop yields from year to year, tell that we shall have the best yield we have had for some four years. The alleged attempt is said to have been due to rumors of improper conduct between the Attorney-General and one of his employees. It will be remembered that the Attorney-General, in deciding a case wherein the reading of the bible in the public school was involved, went out of his way to render a nice little epilogue upon morals. Alas, these purists in high places; these patriots of morals.

WRITES OF HILLSBORO.

G. W. Harper, of the Robinson, Ill., Argus, writes his home paper of his recent visit here, thus: "Thursday we went to Hillsboro, some twenty miles west from Portland, which is the county seat of the adjoining county, and is a town hardly as large as Robinson, and of about the same age as Portland. It has some very fine country around it, and as it was the first level country to be seen to the extent of sight since passing the prairies of the Dakotas, we were forcibly reminded of home. On the route we saw the contrast of winter and spring wheat on the two sides of the railroad track, and in adjoining fields. The one was just ready for the reaper, while the other was green and would not be ready for harvest before August. The wheat, oats, rye and barley are all of a fine quality, and larger grain than that of Crawford county.

The day we spent in Hillsboro we were most handsomely entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Benton Bowman at their delightful home. There was no doubt "a mutual admiration society" in this meeting of former Robinson friends in their far away home, and visitors in a strange part of the country. Mr. Bowman's many friends back in Crawford will be pleased to know that in his new home he is doing well, is pleasantly situated, and that he and his nice little family are held in high esteem. His sister, who came here a year or two later than he, a few weeks ago went to Sitka, Alaska, where she had a call as a teacher. We have had some new demonstrations of the fact that you cannot hide yourself in this great and vast country from those whom you have known, and who have known you, or of whom you have known. In Hillsboro we knew lived Bruce Huston, who read law some twenty five years ago with G. N. Parker, but we found also Mr. Carlisle, who is in the harness business, and also learned that a brother of the late Judge Scholfield lived there, as had also the family, his father dying only a few years ago. We were favorably impressed, not only with the country around Hillsboro, and town, but with the people. If we were seeking a new home we certainly should feel strongly inclined to make choice of that place. We did not see Bruce Huston, as he was away from home, but visited his suite of office rooms, three in

number, having the largest law library in the city, costing over \$5,000, and were pleased to learn that he was not only the leading attorney in his county, but had a practice to some extent in Portland. And yet, like many other young men who have gone out from Crawford county and made a success, he came out here a poor boy, having been just admitted to the bar, and first worked in a single factory to get a little money ahead for a start, and rapidly forged his way to the front.
