Tax people of Oregon will next year have an opportunity to tell by their ballots whether or not they want to be the real governors of the state or whether they want some man, or set of men, to rule them. The new amendment upon which they vote, if carried, will permit direct lawmaking, and it should carry. This measure has often been branded as a "populist" measure. As a matter of fact, it is a measure of no political denomination, and should receive the hearty support of all who are not afraid of their own intelligence.

For twenty-five years the late Conrad Schulmerich was a dominant force in the civil life of Washington county. His ventures were successful because of his intense application. As a county officer, when commissioner, he applied the same rules in public life that he practiced in private life. As a man whose word was as good as his signed bond, he held the esteem of all who knew him; and his reputation was known for good where his person was a stranger.

Some few of our republican statesmen are favoring reduction or repeal of duty on those articles which are manufactured by trusts.
