IN ITS ELEMENT.

Last week's Independent comes out against labor unionism in no uncertain language. The Argus is pleased to see such candor. There is not a trace of any considerable dimension but what is supporting the Hanna idea of government and as the Independent is a Hanna newspaper from habit, custom and environment it is naturally and honestly in its element when it seeks to deny to labor what it is willing to grant to capital—the right to organize. There certainly is no harm in the Independent's position so long as it honestly believes its preachment. It has good company. All the millionaires agree with it. The great steel trust agrees with it. Mr. Hanna agrees with it, and Mr. McKinley is the selected man of the trusts of all origin.

The Independent certainly must be ignorant of the fact that the trusts are stifling competition, and that labor would be at their mercy only for labor unionism. The wage scale would be demoralized in one month but for labor organizations. Every sensible man knows this and this fact is patent to thinking people everywhere. But for unions the laborer must take his medicine as prescribed by the trusts just as the consumer is now doing. Labor makes mistakes, it is true, but this is not the substance of the subject. The right of labor to organize to protect itself is just as sacred as the right of citizenship. Only the trusts and partisan newspapers deny this.

THE LABORER'S FRIEND.

Our friend, The Oregonian, in these days professing a very kindly attitude towards labor, and is going after the trusts with a vengeance. This is not unlike that paper, at all. We all know that it is easy for the Oregonian to be acrobatic in its journalistic attitudes. Well do all its readers remember when, after Dewey's victory, it was anti-expansion even to hysteria, and how after the edict went forth from republican headquarters, it flip-flopped to the rallying cry of expansion with the fervor of all new converts. The trusts are now in control of the administration and The Oregonian will get off its present perch in a few months and squat on the ground of trust sympathy or belie its changeling efforts of the past. Readers of that paper from one year to another do not deny its ability, but they do know it to be one of the greatest of trimmers in American journalism. That it is successful in its dual spirit does not in the least affect the insincerity of its expression.

Boom the Street Fair; give it a good word, and better yet, give it all the help you can. We shall have many visitors here, and let us give them such a treat that they will long talk of Washington county and its resources and productions.

Gov. Geer thinks that the trusts will fall of their own weight. The governor was always noted for unique opinions, but it will be noted that all great trust statesmen think the same thing—that is to say those who are in accord with the party that built the trusts and put them in power.

This county is to have a great exhibit at the coming state fair if efforts on the part of Mr. Heide are worth anything. He is now having his selection put in attractive shape, and one would be surprised to see the endless variety of his exhibits. He still needs more of several kinds of products and those who have some good products will confer a favor on

him, as well as do a good thing for the county, if they will bring them in. Let us all make an effort to send up an exhibit which will bring us first prize.

The city now owns the water and light plant, the transfer having been made this week. If the system shall be managed prudently there will be profit. The Argus believes Mr. Rector, the new superintendent, will give the plant his best attention and that he will make it a paying investment. In his work he should receive the hearty support of all citizens. Every inhabitant has an interest in this property, and with a pull all together we shall see Hillsboro get out of debt—and then it will stay out of debt.

This county should offer splendid inducements to homeseekers. The commonwealth is productive, schools are established upon a basis of solidity, and we have a market which is growing better every year—Portland, the metropolis of the Northwest. We produce everything in the vegetable line that can be raised north of the Mason & Dixon line and we have a climate that is unexcelled.
