THE DEAD PRESIDENT.

President McKinley died at 2:15 Saturday, Sept. 14, and the Nation justly sorrows, irrespective of party or political affiliation. He served his state well, Ohio, as governor and his district in Congress for many years. He was an ardent protectionist always, and even his opposition in politics believed he was sincere in advocacy. While he has been charged with being an opportunist in politics many believe that his chief failing was the reward of those who supported his doctrine. But politics and policies have taught to do with the President's death. He was the victim of an assassin's bullet, and this in a land which is the home of the oppressed. In a domestic form of government there is no need of the murderer's bullet.

The ballot is always left for peaceable revolution. The deed that laid the Executive low was dastardly, and yet it had its mission. That mission was the death to anarchy. People hereafter will cease to coddle opposition to organized government. Party leaders will fight shy of dealing with these creatures for party support. The Argus predicts that never again will John Most be quoted as supporting this candidate, or that candidate, as was the case last election. "The anarchists must go," has been changed to "the anarchist has gone." Hereafter the anarchist is dead. The people tolerate him no longer. Laws will take care of him and his case will be completely covered.

Personally Mr. McKinley was nobility. His errors may be charged to his advisors. He has ever leaned on the side of mercy, as, note his position when he desired to leave the Philippines to independence. He was a model in his family relations. He was true to his friends always. He leaves a name to fame that is bright and illustrious. More cannot be said. His own defense to the opinions of his antagonists in politics afford a marked contrast to the little and rabid assaults of his own party associations.
