EXHIBIT DELAYED—BURNED BRIDGE

Best State Fair for Years. Very Bad
Weather.

The weather was the only bad feature of the State Fair at Salem last week, and visitors aver that it was the "best ever," so far as exhibits were concerned. Washington county pulled down the third prize on its agricultural and horticultural exhibit, and the many sightseers there allege that this county's exhibit was as good as any and that had the exhibit been awarded first prize there would have been no criticism. The trouble with our exhibit was that not sufficient time was had to arrange the exhibit as attractively as was wanted, owing to the time lost in getting the attractions up there. This was occasioned by the trouble burning out near Raleigh, and Messrs. Heidel and Sewell, who had the matter in charge, had barely time to get the magnificent display straightened out before the fair opened.

The Oregonian correspondent at Salem, in his article on the various exhibits, stated that no one would have had room for criticism had the judges awarded the first prize to either this or Benton county, while Washington county visitors say that our fruit and grass exhibits were commented upon as the best by thousands of visitors from abroad.

The displays are here and have a prominent place in the Street Carnival. Mr. Heidel is to be congratulated for the public spirit manifested in getting up so good an object lesson of our resources and production, and under the circumstances he need not feel aggrieved that he did not carry away the first premium.

THE WEEK'S BASEBALL.

Forest Grove is having plenty of legal amusement these days over an ordinance passed some months ago, relative to prohibiting the construction of wooden buildings within the limits of a block fronting on the main street of the town. It appears that Dr. C. L. Large, John E. Bailey and Mayor Hinman were on the council at the time the ordinance was passed. Within a week each of the three has been served with a writ to appear before the recorder to show cause why they should not be fined for violating the ordinance. GRANNIS, OF SALEM, COMES HERE.

The Appointments as They Affect
Washington County.

The Oregon Methodist Episcopal Conference, after a five days' session, closed in this city Monday evening. All speak highly of the way in which they were entertained by the people of Hillsboro, and resolutions were adopted thanking the citizens of the town and the entertaining pastor, Rev. H. Oberg, for the marked and cordial hospitality extended. Just prior to adjournment the appointments were read. So far as they affect Washington county in the future, or those who are now in charge of pastorates here, the changes are:

Rev. H. Oberg, of this city, goes to Astoria.

Rev. G. W. Grannis, of Salem, comes to Hillsboro.

L. F. Belknap remains at Forest Grove.

F. S. Clemo takes the Cornelius charge, while Rev. Kershaw, present incumbent, takes a charge in Montana.

F. H. Calder takes the Dilley charge.

Beaverton and Ames Chapel, H. L. Clair.

The conference sends C. E. Cline for another year at University Park, and Rev. Elworthy, well known here, stays another year at Sunnyside. The charge given Mr. Oberg at Astoria, is a much larger one than this, and the support, financially, is considerably better.

HERMAN SCHULMERICH BACK

Herman Schulmerich, well known here, and who served four years as Hillsboro's postmaster under Cleveland, has returned from the Sumpster mining district, where he has been managing the Oregon Power & Placer property all summer. Mr. Schulmerich is hale and hearty and as brown as an Indian. He has done a great deal of development work this summer and made a clean up that was entirely satisfactory. TOWN CROWDED WITH VISITORS
