

NEW RULING BY
COUNTY COURTMade on Road Petitions and
Remonstrances.

SUIT BALL WILL FIGHT MANDAMUS

Authorized to Procure Counsel to Fight
McHargue's Suit.

The County Court met last week and transacted the following business:

Petition location county road No. 390, J. Hartweiger et al. Remonstrance filed by W. C. Davidson being greater numerically than petition, it was ordered that road be not established.

Petition for county road, H. R. Findley et al. Cause continued until November term.

Report of fees collected by county clerk, \$98, approved.

Report of county recorder, fees collected, September, \$141.75, approved.

Report of sheriff on 1900 tax roll approved and filed.

Petition public easement O. G. Barlow et al. ordered that Thos. Tucker, Wm. Hay and Peter Boscow be appointed appraisers to meet at Barlow residence October 15, and with county surveyor view and survey said road.

Appointment of John Jones as deputy sheriff confirmed.

Bridge on Portland-Scholls road accepted, and ordered that warrant in sum of \$42.45 be drawn contractor, D. B. Reasoner, contract price plus \$3.65 for lumber turned over to supervisor.

Following warrants were ordered drawn for labor on Hartley bridge near Greenville: J. Prickett, hauling lumber, \$8.75; Chas. Herb, work, \$3; A. N. Phipps, work, \$3; J. B. McNew, labor, \$1.50; Walter Hannan, hauling, \$1.50; total, \$18.75.

Ordered that any signer of petition or remonstrance on road prayer must have residence within three miles of said proposed change or location of road.

Petition of C. P. Hadley to purchase a 16 ft 2 in x 5 w, was considered and ordered that quit claim of county follow upon payment of not less than \$150.

Wilkins bridge and fill accepted, and warrant ordered drawn to contractor, Wm. Nelson, in sum of \$417.00, said contractor to erect railing as soon as fill properly settles.

Superintendent Ball authorized to procure legal counsel to defend the mandamus suit brought against him by one U. S. McHargue.

J. C. Miller and John Loftis allowed \$4 each, for witness fees before county court alleged insanity case.

Washington County has reason to be pleased with the street fair which closed in this city Saturday evening, after a three days' jollification. Thousands of people came and all were pleased with the exhibits, and all went away satisfied that no like display of our resources was ever before seen on the west side of the Willamette river and many contend that it is the best county showing ever made in the state of Oregon.

The first prize for best exhibit of grains and grasses was given Grant Mann, who had many different varieties and whose exhibit is now wanted by the Southern Pacific Company for their permanent display. This prize carried a \$10 premium.

S. Paisley, of Buxton, carried off first prize on Washington county cigars tobacco grown on his ranch near Buxton. This was a \$25 prize and the Native Sons were to keep the exhibit. The team captained by C. Jack was coached by Long, while Sappington did the coaching for Simpson's team. Jack's men succeeded in getting water on a set fire within four minutes and Simpson followed twenty seconds later. The prize of \$250 was awarded to the first nine, and the eighteen firemen are to have an oyster supper with the proceeds. The run was the prettiest and speediest ever made over a six hundred feet course. Fully two thousand people witnessed the tryout. After the horse contest C. Larsen and Geo. Cummings had a duel with the hose, which lasted for five minutes. Each succeeded in getting much water on the other, but when time was called Senator Wehrung and Ex-sheriff Bradford awarded first prize, \$5, to Larsen, and second money, \$2, to Cummings—and it was earned.

The only other race for the day was between Geo. Billings' sorrel filly and Lyons' black, the former winning.
