SOMETHING TO SHOW OUR VISITORS

Now for a Permanent Pavilion for the Displays.

The city council has at last decided to fit up a place in the fire apparatus room for a temporary place for the Washington county exhibit which was on exhibition at the state fair. This is a move in the right direction. The room will be partitioned and a glass front put in, and the exhibit can then be seen to advantage by all visitors to Hillsboro, both from the county and abroad. The arrangement will in no way curtail the room for the apparatus. The ladies' auxiliary coffee club culinary department will be given quarters in the old council chambers, up stairs, and the room will be used only for that purpose and city elections. A window will be cut in the south wall of the building to give the display plenty of light. Now, let the movement for a building in the courtyard, to be used as a permanent place for the display of our county resources and productions, go forward, and let everybody keep working until it is an assured thing. What is better for us than a pavilion of this kind? It is something that every county should have, and the sooner we get it the sooner we will be progressive, and known as a progressive community.
