

EDWARD SUTHERLAND SUICIDED LAST FRIDAY

Financial Trouble Supposed
the Cause.

WAS HIGHLY RESPECTED CITIZEN.

Placed Muzzle of Shotgun in Mouth and
Discharged Weapon.

Edward F. Sutherland, aged about 40 years, a resident blacksmith of Scholls, last Friday committed suicide a short distance from home, by shooting himself in the mouth with a shotgun. Sutherland left home early in the morning with his gun, stating that he was going in search of China pheasants and would return at noon. As he did not return at the time stated, his family became alarmed and instituted search, resulting in finding the body near the Tualatin river, a short distance from the family residence. The whole right side of the head was almost completely blown off. The gun lay a few feet in front of the body and a small stick with which the trigger of the gun had been tripped was found close by.

Sutherland was at one time a resident of Portland, and later moved to McMinnville, where he resided with his family for nearly nine years, following the blacksmith business; moving to Scholls nearly a year ago. He was industrious and sober and had a wide circle of friends who extend their sympathies to the bereaved family in their affliction.

Sutherland was a nephew of Judge Sutherland, of Salt Lake City, author of "Sutherland on Damages," a standard legal authority.

The remains were taken to McMinnville on Saturday evening's train, where the funeral was held Sunday. A wife and six children survive.

Henriel, another daughter, and the petitioner, charges that her mother, by reason of old age and sickness, was not of sound mind on August 11, 1900, the date her will was executed, and that Ferdinand, Julia Groner Marquam and U. S. Marquam, her husband, by means of false statements and misrepresentations, induced deceased to make her will according to their directions, whereby they became the beneficiaries. It is also alleged that these persons induced the testator to believe that her other children, and especially the petitioner, had ceased to care for her, and by reason thereof they were out of the will. The estate is a large one and consists of real and personal property in Washington and Multnomah counties.
