DOG CASE IN COURT.

W. E. Thorne, who resides on a
farm just south of town, was yes-
terday given a hearing before Jus-
tice J. P. Randall, of South Hills-
boro, on a charge of maliciously
and wantonly killing a dog, the
property of E. B. Sappington.

The prosecution claimed that the
dog was a valuable one, and that
not given to annoying anyone, and
that on Saturday morning, October 19,
Thorne, without any justification,
purposely shot and killed the dog
near the home of Captain Collins,
in South Hillsboro. Thorne took
the stand in his own defense and
admitted shooting and burying a
dog on the date alleged, but denied
having any knowledge as to who
was the owner of the dog at the
time of the killing. Mrs. Thorne
had been raising some Chinese
pheasants, and it was claimed the
dog frequented their place almost
daily, and disturbed these birds
and other fowls, besides doing con-
siderable damage to flower beds,
that in fact he was a continual
source of annoyance.

The matter was taken under ad-
visement until 11 o'clock today,
when Mr. Thorne was held to ap-
pear before the circuit court, with
bonds fixed at \$200. Attorney Geo.
R. Bagley, assisted in the prosecu-
tion, and John M. Wall defended.
