ROAD IS COMINGHillsboro to be Connected
With Portland.

NEW COMPANY AT THE HELM.

Promoter says That he has Huge
Franchise Petition.

Mr. A. Graydon, connected with the company that is promoting an electric line between this city and Portland, via Cedar Mill, was in this city Tuesday, and made this office a pleasant call. He states that his company has plenty of money to construct the line, and that as soon as franchises are obtained from Multnomah and Washington counties, active construction will commence. He says that a majority of the property owners along the highway between this city and Cedar Mill have signed a petition to have the county court grant a franchise for the right-of-way on the county highway, where the company may see fit to use the same.

That a motor line like this will be of incalculable value to property owners along the line goes without saying, and that such a line will bring us more settlers, and result in a larger population and greater production, is assured through the experiences of all communities affected in like manner. That it will give us better schedules for passenger traffic is settled. That it will make this city a better town in many respects, is generally admitted by all. That the Southern Pacific has impeded progress as much as possible in Portland, is generally believed by those on the inside, as the line will cut into that company's income to a considerable extent. Let us hope that the promoters will come with a petition so strong that a franchise will be granted. Let us give up to improvement, and be improved, whether some want improvement or not.
