The city of New York has gone republican-fusion, and Tammany Hall loses its power. This may be construed in many different ways, but the most logical analysis, is, perhaps, that the democratic voters have a conscience, and were tired of being governed by Croker, who spends the most of his time in England. When a democrat wants a change he votes for it. Not so, however, with republican Philadelphia, where rottenness ruled rampant as even compared with vicious New York. There the voter stood to party lines and gave Quay a return to the power he has enjoyed for years. Decent citizenship all over the union hoped to see the Quay machine defeated in Pennsylvania, but "hope deferred maketh the heart sick." There is something radically wrong with the citizenship of the Quaker City.
