PERTINENT QUESTIONS.

It was to have been expected that northern papers would wax wroth and grow bitterly sarcastic in replying to southern strictures upon the president for entertaining Booker T. Washington at dinner. But the southern papers are replying by asking some pertinent questions and citing some pertinent facts. They point out the fact that northern love for the negro is confined to election day. How many business offices in the north employ negro clerks? How many negro trainmen are employed on northern railways? How many negroes have been appointed to postmaster-ships in the north? How many northern states have elected negro senators or congressmen? How many negro mechanics are employed in northern mills and factories alongside white mechanics? North he is limited to the position of porter in hotels and on trains, or to waiterships in hotels and restaurants. Is there a negro linyotype operator on any great daily newspaper in the north that is so "roundly" denouncing the south for its attitude toward the Roosevelt-Washington dinner incident? Does any one of these northern republican daily newspapers employ a negro pressman, a negro reporter or a negro city editor? Some of these days the negro will realize that he has nothing to gain from the alleged friendship of men who seek to use him for political purposes only.—Commoner.

INASMUCH as the Willamette river and its tributaries flow through a great territory and provide a water shed for the commerce and production of thousands of people who pay state taxes, it would appear that an effort should be made to have a successful fish way out through the falls at Oregon City. The people at large are taxed to support fish commissioners and if the Willamette Valley farmers want a salmon they must buy them from the privileged territory. With a fish way through the falls there would be good runs of salmon in this section and up the valley, and taxpayers certainly would not object to an occasional salmon in season without paying ten cents per pound. An attempt has been made in the past to remedy this, but the effort was not a success for some reason or other. If the farmers of the valley want a salmon run they will do well to see that their legislators make some move toward an open river. The expense would be very small compared to the vast benefits to be received. The valley has been contributing to the lower river long enough and it is high time for an exchange of courtesies.

Portland should lose no time in getting into shape for the Lewis & Clark exposition. Why figure so extensively on profit and loss? Do the dear people of Oregon expect to make a fortune at once and secure a benefit that shall be lasting without the outlay of a few dollars? Future generations will enjoy the good to be extracted from the event, and Portland merchants will not wait long after the celebration closes until they will see their balance sheets to the better.

Secretary Gage has not added in the least to his popularity by the expressions of his views to the bankers at Milwaukee. Whatever the republican party leaders may think on the subject of the retirement of the greenbacks, they are not prepared to defend any such issue before the country and they are annoyed with the secretary of the treasury for having given utterance to such view while still a member of the president's cabinet. —Menomonee (Wis.) Times.

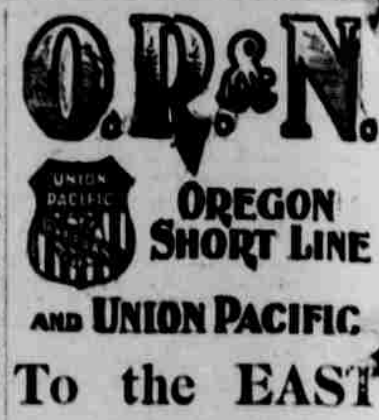
