

PECULIAR ACCIDENT NEAR THIS CITY

Another Pitchfork Incident,
Saturday Last.

TINE ENTERED CHILD'S NOSTRIL.

Two-Year-Old Boy Gets in Way of
Fork.

A little two-year-old boy, the son of Frank Hilleck, who resides below the Minter bridge, met with a very severe and infrequent accident last Saturday afternoon, while playing around the barn. His father was forking out manure, and did not know the little chap was within reach. Just as he was throwing out a fork full of the hay entered the path of the throw and one tine entered the left nostril, penetrating up the nasal channel, and going on beyond the left eye. Dr. Bailey attended the child, it being brought to the city at once. The little fellow is just beginning to toddle around and delights in following his father around the place. Mr. Hilleck says that he did not see the lad until it was too late to stop the force of the blow. The physician says that he believes that the tine did not enter the brain. The wound, while a serious one is thought not to be fatal.

THE CITY TICKET.

About twenty-five citizens attended the mass meeting Monday evening, at the city hall, and nominated a ticket to be voted upon next Monday, Mayor F. A. Bailey presiding. Benton Bowman acted as secretary. Dr. F. A. Bailey, the chairman of the evening, and present mayor, was renominated. Hon. W. N. Barrett was nominated to fill the unexpired term as councilman, vice Dr. J. P. Tammie, resigned. The other council nominees for the two-year terms were: S. B. Huston, Max Crandall and W. D. Smith. Benton Bowman, the first named, for recorder, declined the nomination. H. T. Bagley was then nominated. A. C. Shute, cashier of the bank, was nominated for city treasurer. Dr. Bailey, after the nominations were closed, reviewed the actions of the council in the work of the last year, covering the purchase of the water and light plant, its cost, \$24,500, then gave a detailed statement of the city's financial condition, an outline of its receipts, and closed by stating that a close estimate of the city's income and disbursements would foot a balance of \$2,000, at least, for a sinking fund to apply annually on the outstanding debt of the city. The mayor was very sanguine over the condition of the town, and stated that each year would see a diminution of the city's floating debt.

The warrant debt of the city is \$8,559.41. The bonded debt is \$24,500. This makes a total debt of \$33,059.41.

Mr. Huston states that he declines to serve, as he has much other work of public nature, and he thinks he has had his turn at city affairs, having served as councilman and mayor some years.

Geo. P. Clark, the expert accountant, who with his partner, Mr. Buchanan, exported the Washington county books, and who is now engaged in going over the Marion county records, has been given a taste of high life as to how politics affect his kind of work. Clark & Buchanan had just started to work on the Marion county records, subsequent to a decision by Judge Boise that the court had a right to hire, when Mr. Clark was arrested, taken to Vancouver, and jailed, on a charge of having forged a name to a Clarke county, (Wash.) warrant. Mr. Clark proved that he got the warrant through the means of an order, indorsed to him by M. Block, Portland's Jew broker, who bought the warrant from the drawee, Mrs. O. N. Denny, of Portland. It is thought that the warrant of arrest was inspired by the Marion county ring, who desired to discredit the work of the experts.

CIRCUIT COURT OPENED MONDAY

County Can Not Collect In-
quest Costs.

CARL LARSEN CASE DISMISSED.

Grand Jury Impaneled and Sworn.

Circuit court opened Monday morning with court officers as follows:

J. N. Hoffman appointed guardian ad litem Roos heirs, to defend case instituted by Edward Roos.

School patrons and others will be interested in the fact that Superintendent Ackerman has just completed the revised rules for conducting public schools' eighth grade examinations. These rules are to be in force throughout the state. Several changes have been made. Among the most important are, the time for holding the examinations are on such days of February, April, May and June as the superintendent of public instructions may indicate. The teacher must certify that the applicant has finished all the branches prescribed by the state course of study. Pupils who reach an average of 80 per cent and do not fall below 70 per cent in any one branch will be considered as successfully passing the examination. If applicant does not fail in more than two studies he shall be allowed to rewrite on these subjects the following examination. If he fail in more than two studies the entire examination must be taken again.

FORMER GREENVILLE BOY LOSES HIS LIFE

Was Accidentally Killed by
Discharge of Shotgun.

HUNTING ON COLUMBIA SLOUGH.

Head was Blown Half Off. Terrible
Accident.

Sydney Spreadborough, formerly a resident of Greenville, while hunting on Columbia Slough, between Portland and Vancouver, met death Sunday forenoon, as a result of the discharge of a shotgun in the hands of a fellow huntsman by the name of S. L. Banks. Young Spreadborough was 24 years of age, and lived at Greenville several years, where his brothers, Alfred, William and Alex now reside. For some time he has been in the employ of the City & Suburban Railway Co., in the capacity of car repairer. He was a bright, industrious young man, and generally popular. Banks and Spreadborough had started to intercept some ducks which were about to light on the "Lily Patch." They hurried behind an old tree. Spreadborough stooped to keep out of sight, and getting his gun in position, gradually raised to fire. Banks was behind him. Both had their guns cocked. Banks aimed, and as he pulled the trigger, Spreadborough raised from the stooping posture and came within range of his companion's gun, his head receiving the charge of shot. Death was instantaneous.

The remains were brought to Greenville for burial.
