WHEELER WINS OUT.

In 1893 Ira Wheeler conveyed to his brother, David R. Wheeler, of Reedville, a large farm near that place for the consideration of \$8,000. Subsequent to that time the Garnier & Company, of San Francisco, procured a judgment against Ira Wheeler, and brought a suit to set aside the deed to David, the brother, on the ground that it was made without consideration, and in order to avoid the payment of his debts. The cause was tried before Judge McBride two years ago. His decision was rendered in favor of Wheeler. The case was appealed to the supreme court and was decided last Monday, again in favor of Wheeler. Emmons & Emmons, of Portland, represented Garnier, and S. B. Huston and Thos. H. Tongue were counsel for the defendant. The farm is a valuable one, and is, or was, rather, worth \$8,000, and this would have been lots of money for one man to lose.

NO, IT DOESN'T.

This turnip beats the world.—The largest and most wonderful turnip grown, as far as the archives show, can be seen on exhibition at Lamberson's seed store on Front street, near Yamhill. It grew and expanded at Glencoe. It has a circumference of 45 inches, is over 18 inches in diameter, and is round and well proportioned being nearly round. Its weight on arrival was 234 pounds, and still tips the scales at 214 pounds, after shrinking from the world's contact. It is to be photographed to scale and then shipped to Charleston's exposition, so it can be seen only a couple of days longer.—Oregonian.

Evidently the Oregonian man has not seen the turnip brought in by J. C. Miller, and now on exhibition at F. M. Heide's. This turnip weighed 33 pounds, and is 4 feet and 1 inch in circumference.

CHARGED WITH LARCENY BY BAILEE

Gained Prominence as a Promoter
and Business Man.

We all know Austin Craig, Craig, the invincible, the one-time editor of the Forest Grove Hatchet and Times, consolidated, and whose career in this ballad of Washington county was meteoric and a genuine calcium flashlight with living and moving pictures! Well, Austin is in trouble up at Sumpter, or Baker, or Whitney—a matter of a few miles is nothing to our Austin. Yesterday's dispatches say:

Baker City, Or., Dec. 9.—Austin Craig, general mine and real estate promoter, representative of the bank of Sumpter, state agent, city recorder and postmaster of the town of Whitney, was arrested today on the charge of larceny by bailee. He was taken to Sumpter, where he was admitted to bail in the sum of \$2000 pending his preliminary examination tomorrow. A PIONEER OF
FOREST GROVEMrs. Porter, a Well Known
Woman, Dies.

SHE CAME TO OREGON IN 1845.

Died at Her Home Last Saturday.
Funeral Tuesday.

Mrs. Ellen Porter, an Oregon pioneer of 1845, aged nearly 65 years, died at her home, one mile west of Forest Grove, Saturday night. She was born in Ohio, and crossed the plains to Oregon by way of Meek's cut-off. The party were lost in the mountains, and suffered great hardships. Mrs. Porter was twice wedded in Washington county, her first marriage being to Joseph Raffety, in 1855, who died five years later. They had two sons, one of whom, William Raffety, of Forest Grove, is living. In 1862 she was married to Jerome A. Porter, who died in 1896. Four children survive: Avery J., Charles A., Cary W. and Mrs. Collin Campbell, of Ceylon, Minn. Charles A. left home over 20 years ago, and has not been heard from. Avery J. is living in California, and Cary on the home farm. Deceased has been a member of the Congregational church for over 40 years. Interment was in the Buxton cemetery.

Judge McBride today held an adjourned session of circuit court. District Attorney Allen was not present. W. E. Milam, familiarly known as "Bud" Milam, and who was jointly indicted with Jas. Aiken for the murder of the Raleigh Chinaman, last Fall, was in court, and, through Attorney Malarkey, asked to have his case dismissed.
