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Opposed to Gold Mono-metallism. Believes in the Bimetallic Standard. Dear Money means Debased Property, and Profitless American Product. Our Consequent loss is our Creditors' Gain. Has no use for Marcus A. Hanna.

HAVE YOU THOUGHT OF IT?

Do you remember—do you remember? Do you remember when President Roosevelt was only a colonel in the Volunteer Army, during the war with Spain? Do you remember that "round robin," whereto Mr. Col. Roosevelt's name was signed? Do you not shudder at such insubordination? This was certainly demoralizing to our national army organization—terribly disorganizing, and all that! Poor Mr. Alger, who was Mr. Roosevelt's superior officer, was very naughtily called to account in that instrument. And, yet, the American nation did not chastise Mr. Col. Roosevelt for his mutiny, and example of insubordination. But, when a man and officer like General Miles commends Mr. Dewey's minority report, and when his utterances are being indorsed by every lover of justice and every hater of injustice, the President promptly proceeds to paste Miles on the solar plexus. Funny, is it not, how the little hungry press of the country keeps still when so deadly a parallel presents itself? Have you ever thought of it? Did it ever strike you that it is hard for a man to serve two masters, two contrary lines of policy?

GOOD PROSPECTS AHEAD.

Washington county real property has been changing hands considerably lately, but it is not a comparison to what it will be from this on. The Northwest has the climate, the soil, and the production, to warrant a great immigration, and it is sure to come. Already it is started, and the farmers, who for years have withstood the rigors of Eastern winters, and heat of summers, are starting to Oregon and Washington, where there is no such thing as crop failure, and where the climate is equable the year round. The Lewis & Clark centennial, and the advertisement that it is sure to give this section, is going to be a great benefit to this quarter of the United States. Washington county will come in for its share of the benefit, for but few sections in the state have so good soil, and so close a great market—a market that must each year grow better and better.

As a matter of personal pride we do not want Mr. Carnegie's money with which to build a National University—or any other old thing Mr. Carnegie has been given this wealth by the people of America. Rank legislation made him the millions. The people have been taxed to permit his tremendous fortune—but they are not kicking. They do not want it back. In the vernacular, they are not "squealing." It's his now, and if they wanted it back they would prefer saying to what purpose it should be used. But Uncle Sam was never very fond of crow or conscience money, and he does not want the graft returned to the grafter's glory. Not much! Let Mr. Carnegie buy him a golf suit and new links with the seeds!

The legislature of Utah has memorialized congress for a sixteenth amendment, granting the right of woman to vote. The women of Utah already have that right on state affairs—and they want all the nation's women to have a right to vote. Here in Oregon the "boss" politicians don't want equal suffrage. Utah, the Mormon state, is thus in the forefront for woman—but, perhaps, the men, having more than one wife, could not withstand the feminine pressure and voted suffrage to get away from a domestic majority.

The Atlanta Constitution says we get but one per cent of the trade

of the Philippines, while foreign nations get the other ninety and nine. Well, what of it? What difference does this make to our country? Don't we get one hundred per cent of the offices, military and civic. Does the Constitution want us to have the earth? So long as we get all the offices and glory, what right has the Oregonian to reprint such balderdash from the Atlanta paper. It simply isn't American. "Such a business!"

THE late Gov. Rogers, of the State of Washington, was one of the ablest men in Western political life, and everywhere are heard expressions of regret at his death. The state has lost a citizen of worth and an officer of merit. In rugged honesty, sterling integrity, and soundness of executive judgment, Mr. Rogers has few peers. Of the several times that he was an aspirant for official honors, he was never once defeated.

AND now the bankers want to retire the greenbacks. Another step toward banker rule. As a matter of fact, owing to the increase of the output of gold there has been a greater per capita the last year than ever before, and the quantitative theory of money has been sustained. As financiers can't get the best possible action on their money under the circumstances, they want a little contraction.

It would seem that the town was turned into a regular Belshazzar feast, and from the account of the hilarities published, one would be inclined to think that the Tualatin Wolves had gone to the city of the Willamette for a time.
