BOTH DIED FROM TAKING ARSENIC.

Mrs. Gaunt raised in Hillsboro. Ungerman girl known here.

McMinnville had a double suicide, yesterday, the principals being Miss Nannie Ungerman and Mrs. Ollie Gaunt, the latter of whom was raised in Hillsboro, being the daughter of D. McCamish.

According to the press reports, Miss Ungerman was night operator at the McMinnville station and Mrs. Gaunt was with her, the two being inseparable, at the time the arsenic was taken.

The Ungerman woman was a blonde and was rather a handsome girl. Mrs. Gaunt was not living with her husband and it is supposed this was one of the causes leading to the suicide.

The remains of Mrs. Gaunt will arrive here Friday morning and have interment in the Masonic cemetery. The services will be held at the residence of Jos. Downs at 1:00 P. M.
