WELL KNOWN FIRM SUFFERS BIG LOSS

Albers & Schneider, of Portland, Lose by Fire.

FIFTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS.

Well Known in Washington County, Where They Bought Hay.

Albers & Schneider, of Portland, and well known in Washington county, where they have bought timothy hay and oats for government shipment to the Philippine Islands, for several years, suffered a fifty-five thousand dollar loss by fire Sunday morning, their mills and warehouse going up in ashes. The blaze is supposed to have started from a junk shop next door to the Albers & Schneider property. The firm is more than well known here, and the Albers boys are favorites at Hillsboro. Noted for their square dealing, and promptness, they have made friends wherever they have dealt. Wm. Albers, who is now with the firm, worked with the Kammas out here for several years. During the fire, Henry C. Albers was beaten into insensibility by a Portland policeman, Church. Mr. Albers was trying to enter his own building, and the officer tried to force him to desist. Mr. Albers insisted on going in, and the club was brought into requisition. Mr. Albers left the hospital Monday morning, and it is more than likely that he has a good cause for damage action against the city. The loss by fire was covered by insurance. It is said that the firm will get new quarters and again engage in business.

Sheriff Sewell has already collected over \$6000 on the 1901 tax roll, many having taken advantage of the 3 per centum rebate. Over \$2500 were collected yesterday. The roll will be officially opened March 1, and then there will be a regular stampede to get the advantage of the draw-back guaranteed by law. As the state law gives the county privilege to pay one-half the state tax before May 1, and then until November 1 to pay the balance, without any interest, the treasurer will soon commence reducing what little warrant indebtedness lays against the county. Warrants are called to November 1, and that leaves but three months' drafts yet in circulation. The county will most likely take advantage of the proposition to pay half of the state tax, and then use the money collected to pay off all warrants, as fast as they are issued. This means that Washington county is financially in fine feather—the best for years. This is the way to conduct public affairs, and that taxpayers are appreciative is proved by the many words of commendation heard coming from them.

There is a move on foot to establish a cheese factory, on a small scale, in this city; the cheese maker being a late arrival from Tillamook, where he turned out a product that had ready sale in Portland. Two or three men have interested themselves in the project, and it is thought that it will be established beyond a doubt. The Board of Trade is bending every energy to have it come here, and though it will be small at the start, it is a business which will grow and expand like the proverbial Green Bay Tree. Swiss cheese and the delightful Limburger will be the output. Gee! This should suit some of our Limburger enthusiasts.

There is a petition going the rounds of the West Side, asking the Southern Pacific to operate a suburban service, between Forest Grove and Portland. The petition sets up that the morning train is altogether too early, and that the wait in Portland is too long. The signers seem to think that such a service would pay from the very start, owing to the increase of travel it would create. The Board of Trade may take up the matter later on, as well as arrange for a meeting with the mayor and council of Portland to talk over the matter of a franchise for a motor line to tap this section.

With great storms raging along the coast, doing much damage, old Washington county, situated between the Columbia hills and the Coast Range, has contented herself with just a little too much of the fall of aqua pura to make things comfortable, but otherwise we have been doing nicely. There is no spot in the state of Oregon so nicely protected against the elements, and the worst we get is high water, which is of no great damage. The county streams are all booming, and this is probably the last high water we shall get this winter season.

Prof. C. W. Durette, who was principal of the Mt. Tabor schools when Miss Jennie Archbold accepted a position there, is dead at Olympia, Wash. Many of the teachers of this county will remember Mr. Durette as one of the brightest instructors at a Teachers' Institute held in this city several years ago. He was one of the advanced educators of Portland, and his ability gave him the superintendency of the schools of the capital city of Washington. His ailment was pneumonia.

Messrs. W. H. Wehrung and W. V. Wiley have been getting subscriptions the last day or so for putting Hillsboro and Washington county before the world in the proper light. Many contributed liberally—and many not at all. But this is always to be found, on all matters of public spirit. Such an attitude is not discouraging to those who are philosophers. It takes rustling to make the world move—and rustlers to move it.
