HANNA FOR PRESIDENT.

Hanna is out for president, and his friends will make a try for his nomination. This move has no particular significance. It does not at all mean that Mr. Roosevelt is opposed by the corporation influence of the nation—not at all. It simply means that Mr. Hanna is recognized as the ideal candidate for the position, reasoning from a republican standpoint. Many things that necessarily must be made clear to the executive, should Roosevelt again be made president, need be untouched if Hanna were the man. Hanna is the real executive brains of the party as it now controls the destiny of the country. He is a commercialist who makes a success out of politics and commercialism. He controls vast interests, and he is persona grata with the big and powerful corporations, because his interest is their interest. Hanna could be as easily elected as Roosevelt. It is a matter only of nomination. That Hanna would be a diplomat in the presidential chair, goes without saying, and that he could manipulate smoothly, without injuring or fraying his conscience, is another patent proposition. Hanna is the ideal candidate. Let him be the president rather than the go-between. He can carry the New England states and the middle west if money counts for aught in the campaign. As an election is improbable for his ticket without the use of large sums of money, expended by Hanna and his business interest colleagues, it would be consistency to put him up. Hanna is no mean campaigner. He is a past master in the art of politics. Let his party put him up and do away with subterfuge.

OLD-TIME republicans of ability must take a back seat in Oregon. Those who for years have followed the party organization are not good enough to honor with a gubernatorial nomination. Instead, a new proselyte is taken up to head the state ticket. Mr. Furnish is a gold democrat, and left the democratic party in 1896, when Mr. Bryan was nominated. He is a banker by profession, and a politician by natural bent. Twice he was made sheriff by the Umatilla county democrats. When that party had no more honors for the gentleman, he hid himself into the republican ranks, first as a decy, and then as wedge duck. He will know he has been in a race before he has finished the campaign.

BE YOUR OWN GUARDIAN.

Is self-government right? If so, the referendum and initiative follow. Direct legislation means simply an actual instead of a mere theoretical sovereignty of the people. We are governed today, not by a democracy, but by an elective aristocracy holding for a term. The people are sovereign only at the moment of election—the men they elect become their masters for one, two, four, six years, as the case may be. Self-government is one thing—the choosing of the men who are to govern you is a different thing. A child may choose its guardian; a slave might be given a voice in the election of his master and be absolutely subject to his dominion after the choice were made. Power will be used in the interests of its possessor. If the power of government is to be used in the interests of the people they must have continuous and effective possession of the government. We call our legislators "agents" and the people their "principal"—queer agents who can give away their principal's property despite his protest, and are not responsible to him during their term of service; queer principals that cannot veto

his "agents" plans, no matter how much he objects to them, nor instruct his agents what to do whenever he sees fit, nor discharge said agents when they refuse to carry out his orders; queer principal who has to obey the commands of his "agents," instead of giving them order.—Ex.

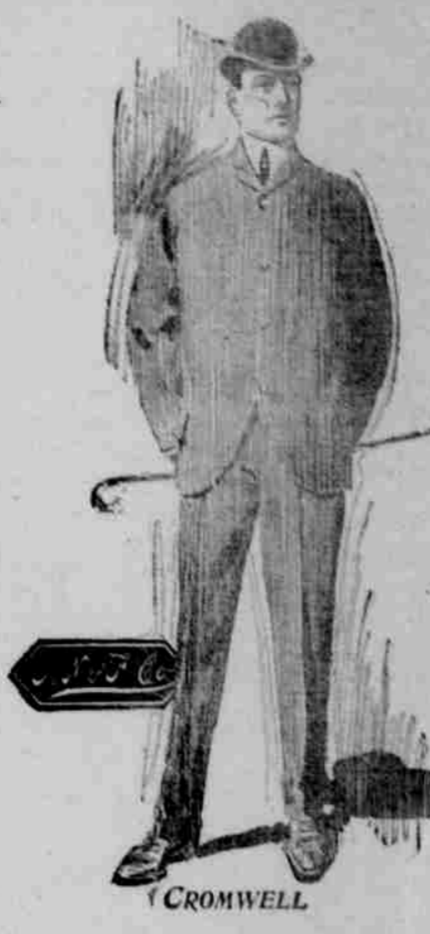
