GAME LAW. The following points of the game law about cover the Washington county field:

BEAVER Unlawful after 1901 to trap or kill beaver for a period of 20 years.

SPOTTED FAWN Unlawful to kill or pursue spotted fawn at any time.

DEER Open season for hunting deer from July 15th to November 1st. Use of dogs prohibited.

ELK Unlawful to kill elk till September 15, 1904.

SILVER GREY SQUIRREL Open season for silver grey squirrel from October 1 to January 1.

DUCKS, GESE AND SWAN Open season from September 1st to March 1st.

Open season for grouse native, pheasant, China pheasant and quail from October 1st to December 1st, limit 10 birds.

TROUT Open season from April 1st to November 1st, limit 125 in one day.

TRESPASS LAW It shall be unlawful for any person at any time to enter into any standing or growing grain, or upon any enclosed premises not the property of the person entering in to or upon the same, with intent to catch, recover, take or kill any bird, or wild fowl or wild animal, or to permit any dog or dogs with which such person may then be hunting to do so for such purpose, without permission from the owner or person in charge of such premises.
