WASHINGTON County is now free from debt and Judge Rood has given the people a splendid administration. That he has many friends who will support him regardless of party, is well known. He has made a record of which no man need be ashamed. Only a few days before the convention, two of the leaders of the opposition admitted that Rood was a judge worthy of reelection.
