A WORD AS TO FLOPPERS.

Last week's Independent, edited by the "bosses," contained about two columns of rot, the gist of which was assault upon The Argus. The Boss contends that it is all right to "flop," and holds men like Hare, Sewell and others as "flopers." Let us see. Every man who knows anything of public affairs in this county knows that Mr. Hare and Mr. Sewell went from a majority party to a minority party; every one knows that they had supported the majority party until it no longer held to the bimetallic plank; then left it to go to one which contained a bimetallic plank, similar to the one the majority party had carried for years. This, then, is the way they flopped. They merely remained true to their convictions. On the other hand, Mr. Furnish left the minority party to go to a majority party, and that, after he had supported a party which had adopted silver plank after silver plank; and after he had used the democratic party to make his

wealth under the old fee system. The "Boss" of the "Scott-Furnish" combine in this county occupies the same unique position, and now "scorns the base degrees" by which he climbed. His "hifalutin'" editorial work in the organ, which he uses as a sort of a bull-whip, will hardly bring about his victory if the people of the county know the situation. Furnish's barrel may again be brought to play, but its tapping is liable to be a disappointing proposition.

"Hot air" may sound very fine to the adherents of the Scott-Furnish combine, but it will hardly go down with the rank and file of voters.

FURNISH OR CHAMBERLAIN?

As citizens who like straightforwardness, whom do we want for governor, Furnish or Chamberlain? Hundreds of republicans will tell you that Furnish practically gained his nomination by the use of hoodie; they will tell you that Mr. Furnish never made a business success of any private business, until after he had made his thousands out of official life. In company with John L. Sperry, of Umatilla, young Furnish engaged in the commission business. The experiment was a failure. He then was successively deputy U. S. marshal and sheriff of Umatilla county, and here is where he made his thousands, getting the start with which he bought the assets of the bank which he now conducts. He worked the "whiskey-to Indians" racket to a farewell. That is where he made money. He had office as sheriff under the old fee system, and that is where he made his money. That he spent thousands of dollars to get his nomination, is the prevailing idea. Hundreds of republicans in his own territory are fighting him as a dangerous man to elect. On the other hand, Chamberlain has held office in Linn and Multnomah counties. He has been faithful to his trust. He is not a rich man—and for this reason he is to be beaten if we accept the Scott-Carey combine for authority. Chamberlain is a plain man of the people and he has never forgotten his friends. He is a true blue, a scholar, and a gentleman. No mark of corruption has ever tainted his official career, and he is a man generally beloved for his sterling qualities. He has splendid executive ability. For his manliness and his unspotted career thousands of republicans will vote for him rather than for Furnish who it is said, will have a desperate struggle to carry his own county. The people of Washington county are an intelligent community. It is a mark of rare discernment to hear many heretofore republicans say that they are going to vote for a clean man to handle affairs in the governor's chair for four years. They say that they want no political opportunist there—and their wishes will more than likely prevail. Indeed, there is but little doubt that Geo. E. Chamberlain will be our next governor.

It is said that Mr. Huston has an ulterior motive in striving to elect his ticket. He is said to be very desirous of having the "ha-ha" on the populists who would not support him for the state senate in 1896. His eggs may not hatch until after they are added—and he may not succeed in his desire to take a delegation to Salem!

THE ARGUS asks every reader to vote for the direct legislation amendment. It will give the people power of making laws, and the power to repeal obnoxious laws.
