Chamberlain was frank and able in his exposition of the features of the campaign, and that he will be a winner is generally conceded by all except the Furnish partisans, who know that they have a terrific fight on their hands. Mr. Chamberlain is sure of a strong support in Washington county. Just watch the vote on June 2.

MILTON EAGLE SCREAMS.

The Milton Eagle, of Umatilla county, Furnish's own home, is "screaming" for Chamberlain, and, although a republican always the editor says, editorially, in a recent issue:

"A national party is composed of the national, state and county organizations. If the party control be captured by men maintaining political organization solely for the purpose of plundering the people or living upon the taxes of the land, the allegiance of every elector in nation, state or county is absolved from that party, so long as such men and such methods are in control. Neither the party nor political integrity can exist in such hands.

Such a condition exists in this county. Political pirates, sailing under the black flag of corruption, have captured the republican party organization for Umatilla county, and have named the candidates upon the district and county ticket from top to bottom. The republican primaries were not free and open, and the election of delegates to the county convention was not confined to republicans.

A sum of money large enough to debauch the primaries and to impose a lasting reproach upon good citizenship in Umatilla county, was poured into the republican primaries, and when the county delegates were selected it was found that the substantial citizens, men who represent the highest aims of the republican party in this county, were relegated to the rear.

Geo. W. Proebstel, a state senator, was refused admission to the county convention. T. C. Taylor, the president of the state senate, was refused admission to the county convention and his seat given to a San Francisco rustler employed in the scouring mill. W. T. Rigby, a man who has served in the legislature with ability and integrity, a Christian, upright gentleman of means and business experience, was told to go back and sit down, and a swarthy half-breed was sent in his stead. L. M. Watrus, of Adams, long prominent in republican councils of the state, and who has a right to adorn his breast with the badge of the Grand Army of the Republic, was shut out. The door of the county convention was slammed in the face of ex-Senator T. J. Kirk, who is now a member of the state legislature, and in the face of Douglas Belts, of Pilot Rock, an ex-member of the House, and in the face of J. E. Smith, who honored a seat in two sessions of the legislature, and who is the largest sheep owner in this county. Hundreds of other illustrations might be cited, but these suffice."

Those voters who, of experience, know that direct legislation is a power in the hands of the people—in speaking of this, we mean those familiar with the Swiss method of direct law-making—are requested to note that throughout the Willamette Valley, the republican papers are not making any effort to induce voters to vote in favor of the measure. Should the amendment pass, it would interfere with all such legislators of the Fulton stripe, whose chief strength is the appropriation bill. The passage of the amendment would not suit the log-rolling politicians of that calibre. The populist and democratic press, without an exception, is urging the carrying of the amendment. The union people, before the voter, are all for the measure and ask your support for it.

CANDIDLY, voter, don't you think that Messrs. Furnish and Fulton, the Oregonian and others, personal and otherwise, are much more interested in the success of their combined ticket than they are in the administration being endorsed? Think this over, and reason out whether they are not trying to flim-flam you into not voting for a set of good men just because they want "to get there" themselves!

WHEN Mr. Furnish bolted in 1896, he advised the managers of the republican party that he carried Umatilla county in his vest pocket, and that he would turn in a majority against Mr. Bryan. The county went against Mr. McKinley by 200. This is about the way that Furnish will carry Umatilla county in 1902!

THE Oregonian argues that if Furnish is beaten, we may have to give up the Philippines. Wouldn't that jar you? The next thing we

know, the Oregonian will tell us that Roosevelt has a wire into his bedroom, and when a message comes in saying that Furnish may be elected, the executive says: "Well, we'll keep the Philippines." And, that when one comes saying Chamberlain is a winner, "Then go the Philippines to the devil!" Mr. Chamberlain, then, is greater than the United States, is he? Quite a compliment, surely!

THE Union legislative ticket is composed of men who are substantial citizens in every respect—men who have made a success of their undertakings. Wm. Schulmerich is a successful dairy man of South Tualatin, and he is well known as one of the best informed men in the state. He makes a study of conditions affecting the farmer, and as he is a thorough going man he will make a good legislator. That he will serve the people of the county as they would be served goes without saying. Hubert Bernards, who is up for reelection, is another self-made man, and his friends are legion who will testify to his uprightness and his sturdy integrity. Mr. Bernards is well known over the county, and he will give his opponents on the opposition ticket a fight that will make Mr. Bernards representative when the votes are counted. Mr. Solomon Weckert is a sturdy German farmer of near Middleton, and the support that he will receive where he is best known will prove him a man of sterling worth. These three gentlemen are all that is claimed for them, and there is every reason to believe that they will represent Washington county in the next legislature.

THE Times, in speaking of the Chamberlain meeting at the Grove, says he had a big audience and the candidates made a good impression with their hearers. The Times said: "When Hon. Geo. E. Chamberlain was introduced he was greeted with hearty applause. He is an easy pleasant speaker and at once put himself in sympathy with his audience by complimenting Forest Grove and its people." The Times is quite a Chesterfield.

Mr. Chamberlain says that when elected governor he will advise the legislature to take the state school land out of the market unless there can be some arrangement made whereby the state can get the value of the properties. Much of this public land has been for years sold at a figure ridiculously low—given away almost. The Governor is all right on this question.

With a Cleveland democrat at the head of the state ticket, and with another Cleveland democrat at the head of affairs in this county, the average republican in Washington county must think that the map has changed. Political acrobats seem to be in high favor with the Scott dictatorship in public affairs. But, wait until we hear the protest!

REGISTRATION closed for Washington county this evening with a total of 3,157, or 296 less than two years ago. This may be augmented by 100 or more blanks, the registry of notaries and justices today. It looks as though the vote would be 150 or 200 short of the last election.

It is said that a prominent republican of this city, a man who pays hundreds of dollars of taxes, told Dr. Wood and Mr. Furnish that he would not be led by ex-demoscrats in this campaign. There are hundreds of others who feel just like this gentleman.

With a Cleveland democrat at the head of the state republican ticket and a Cleveland democrat managing the campaign in this county, "where are we at?" The vote on the 22 of June will tell the story.

If Furnish made himself rich at four years of the sheriff's office, what would he do at four years in the executive's chair at Salem?
