

CHAMBERLAIN HERE
LAST SATURDAYSpoke Here, at Cornelius, and
at Forest Grove

RECEIVED A CORDIAL WELCOME

Talked Straight from the Shoulder in
the Interest of Economy.

Geo. E. Chamberlain, of Portland, nominee for governor on the democratic ticket, addressed large audiences at Hillsboro, Cornelius and Forest Grove, last Saturday afternoon and evening, and the reception given him was flattering, both in the matter of attention and aftermath of expression. "He is all right," said all the people in the faith, and this same expression found favor with many republicans who want to see state business handled properly. Mr. Chamberlain said that he would cut out the grafts, and that he would ask the legislature to send him the appropriation bill fifteen days before adjournment, so he could look the measure over and veto the extravagances in time to have the bill, as a matter of public use, unimpaired. If elected, and they failed to send in the bill as his message requested, he would veto the whole measure if it were not in conformity to strictest economy. On the direct legislation matter, he asked all to vote for it; on the Philippine matter, he said that the islands are ours by treaty, and that he and his platform advocated giving them local government as soon as they were fitted for it, and that was about what the republican platform asked, which is true. He made a splendid impression, and that he made friends and votes by the main way in which he handled his subject, free from froth and rant, is a matter of history. That he will give the banker candidate, Mr. Furnish, a close race in this county, seems generally to be conceded except by those managing the Furnish campaign.

FATHER W. E. SMITH.

Rev. W. E. Smith, of this city, died Monday morning from general debility, and his funeral took place yesterday, at the North Plains cemetery.

Father Smith was born in Fairfield county, Ohio, March 11, 1817, and at an early age entered the ministry. He took an active interest in public life, and was county judge in Ohio. In 1837 he was married to Nancy Adams, in Licking county, Ohio. Eleven children were born to the union, three of whom survive: Dr. Clark Smith, of Santa Cruz, Cal.; Mrs. M. A. Cornelius, of Cornelius, and Mrs. E. C. Cornelius, of Salem. In 1864 he crossed the plains to Oregon, and settled in this county. In 1880 he was married to Miss Mary F. Markee, who survives him. Mr. Smith was a Methodist minister of the old school, and was a pulpit orator of no mean ability. Of the type of fifty years ago, he earnestly exhorted with his hearers when in the pulpit, and his was a unique figure. His strict integrity and force of character made him many friends.

Mr. Smith had been a Mason for many years, and under the auspices of the lodge the funeral was conducted.
