REPLIES TO HUSTON'S CHARGE. Forest Grove, May 27, 1902. EDITOR ARGUS—A pretended friend of mine, Mr. S. B. Huston, in a speech last night, the 26th, at Greenville, so I am informed, made an attack upon my record during the last session of the legislature. In doing so, he either unknowingly or willfully misrepresented the facts, as the record will show.

First: He charged me with voting for the scalp bounty law. The record proves this to be untrue. I did, however, vote for the appropriation to pay off the outstanding warrants on account of the law in existence before I was elected. In '96, Mr. Huston was very vicious in denouncing repudiators. I am now glad to know that I am not so much of a repudiator as Mr. Huston would be. Second: He tried to convey the impression that I "stood in" with the railroads. In this respect I have to say that there were three anti-railroad bills introduced. The record shows that I voted for two of these bills and would have voted for the third had I known that the bill was to come up to be voted upon at the time that it did. Unfortunately, not knowing the bill was to come, I had permission from the speaker of the house to absent myself for the purpose of taking two of my friends to visit the State Asylum. It had been my intention to vote for the bill at all times, and the railroad people were fully aware of my position in the matter.

He further charges responsibility upon the delegation from this county for the loss of land from the northwest part of the county. The first bill introduced was one to straighten the line of Multnomah county. I made a thorough investigation of this bill and found that it did not affect the lands in Washington county. Toward the close of the session, however, a substitute was offered for this bill under a different title, but the body of it contained to be the same as the original bill. The name "Washington County" was not mentioned in the body nor the title of the substitute. This, I was informed to be the fact by a representative from Columbia county, who declared and who made it understood pending the passage of the bill, that it did not affect Washington county in the least, and that it was merely a local bill affecting Columbia county only. This understanding among the members of the house gained for the substitute permission to be passed.

I am also charged as being responsible for extravagant appropriations. Mr. Huston well knows that the majority party is solely responsible for all legislation. Personally, I endeavored to, and did not lose an opportunity to, cut down appropriations. The fact is, whether I voted for or against the appropriation bill, Mr. Huston would consider my act as detrimental to the taxpayer, if he thought he could secure a vote for his candidates, by any old "position."

I did not hear these charges made personally, but they have come to me through indirect sources. I do not object to Mr. Huston or anyone else discussing my record in the legislature, provided, however, they will stand fast to the truth. I am not ashamed of what I have done, and if I have made errors, I willingly admit them; but at all times denounce direct or indirect statements which smack of untruths. These being the facts, all his political statements are to be taken with a grain of salt. HUBERT BERNARDS.
