THE GOVERNORSHIP.

All day long reports have been contradictory as to whether it is Governor Chamberlain or Governor Furnish. Each party headquarters at Portland claims the election and it is the closest contest ever witnessed in the state.

THOUSANDS of Republicans over the state voted for Chamberlain rather than for Furnish. While much of this is charged to the Geer-Simon bolt, yet the real decisive vote that went to him came from Republicans who really believed in Chamberlain and that he was a much better man for Oregon's executive than Furnish.

FOREST GROVE, in the death of Grandma Sloan, loses a character long identified with the history of a historic town. Perhaps no woman in the Northwest, with the exception of Grandma Munra, of Bonneville and Meacham fame, was so well known to the travelling Northwest as this estimable woman, Mrs. Sloan.

From all appearances, the state has given the Initiative and Referendum amendment a sufficient majority to make it a part of our constitution. This is cheering in the face of the fact that few but the Democratic and populist papers were supporting it with any degree of earnestness.

OREGON never before had so close an election on the office of governor.

At 5 P. M. Chamberlain is 335 ahead with returns practically all in. It is Gov. Chamberlain.

THE two Hillsboro precincts were majority for Union, and that is considerable satisfaction—where the supporters of both parties and the candidates of both parties, were well known. There is no place like home!

CUBA has been given her independence and her wish of hundreds of years has been realized. Now if Cuba shall be wise she will apply for admission as a territory as did Texas after that territory has wrested her independence from Mexico.

HILLSBORO's two precincts did nobly for the Union ticket—and we're all proud of the handsome support received at the county seat, north and south. Here it was where better than elsewhere the respective candidates and their supporters were known—and here is where their cause was not forgotten.

IF CHAMBERLAIN is elected the United States will not give up the Philippines until we are ready. The Argus predicts, however, that it will not be many years until the Philippines will get their liberty just as Cuba has hoisted her flag. The American flag has been "pulled down" in Cuba and the country has not gone to the bad.

THE Boer war is ended and the Transvaal is again to be quiet, where for several years has waged a war seldom equalled in history. The English government is signed to provide funds to re-stock the Boer farms, to pay for the cost of the war, and to grant a government which will be practical independence so far as home affairs are concerned. The British army is to be withdrawn.

THE trip to Salt River this month of June will be a Union affair in every respect. Candidates from both sides will make the trip and to keep from being lonesome it should be a consolation party. There is no sociality in the defeated candidates of both parties making the journey alone and one launch will answer the purposes of all.

HILLSBORO is all right. The two precincts did nobly for Chamberlain, carrying one by 10 and the other, south, by 35! The town also did finely for the entire Union ticket with one or two exceptions. Here was the storm center and where all the various phases of the campaign were freely discussed. Columbia also went above expectations. Bean, the Republican supreme judge, gets over 500 in the county. The Unionists should not complain.

THE return of Sheriff Sewell, Clerk Morgan and County Judge Rood for another term is a tribute to the judgment of the people of Washington county. This is a republican county by over 500, and it is a good thing to know that party lines are not closely drawn where merit is involved. These officers have satisfied the people that their labors have been conscientious and the party whip could not keep votes from them when the citizen was in his booth. It is not too little to say that had republicans been elected in their stead that they might have given equal aid as good satisfaction as these officers but it is up to us all to admit that the county has exhibited a splendid spirit of fairness.
