GOVERNOR CHAMBERLAIN.

The voters of Oregon, regardless of party, will not regret the election of Geo. E. Chamberlain to the governorship. Mr. Chamberlain has always displayed a conscientious regard in handling public business, and he will give the people a good administration. Had he not been in the confidence of the people of the state, and had he not stood the highest in public opinion as a man of integrity and ability, he could not have been elected. The bolt against Furnish, while strong, could not have elected him. It was necessary that Chamberlain should receive many votes from the independent republicans—and this he did. Of this independent vote he received more than any other man in Oregon could have received. Those who personally know the gentleman are unanimous in the belief that Oregon will be proud of him as the chief executive. As to Mr. Furnish, where he was best known he received the weakest support. His own county, which went several hundred republican, gave Chamberlain 266 majority. Here was where people knew the "man of action," and here was where he was supported according to his merits. It is useless to say that Lowell did it all. NO COMPROMISE.

The democratic party of the present is watching the efforts of the Mills, Whitneys and Gormans to get control of the party machinery with a great degree of interest. It is certain that if they shall get control, millions of people who are affiliated with the party will leave it. The fight is on. They have no principles that appeal to the thinkers of whatsoever politics. They are of the kind who strain at the gnat and swallow a camel.
