CHARLES MCKINNEY, PIONEER.

Charles McKinney, one of Oregon's early pioneers, died at the home of his son, C. V. McKinney, at Durkee, Baker county, Oregon, Wednesday, June 11, 1902. Mr. McKinney was born in Indiana in 1830, and crossed the plains while yet a boy, in 1845, coming to the northwest by way of Meek's cut-off. The trip was a hard one, and when they arrived here the boys were barefooted. Mr. McKinney was a shoemaker by trade, and was a finished workman. At one time he was possessed of considerable property. He was married twice, his first wife being Miss Mary Bratton. The children by this union were Edward, residing at Condon, Ore., C. V. of Durkee, and Mrs. W. V. Wiley, of Hillsboro. He was married to his surviving wife, in this city, and to them was born Miss Clara McKinney, of this city. The remains will be brought to this city for burial. The funeral services will be held at the residence of W. V. Wiley, at 10 o'clock a. m., Saturday, after which interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.

Out of a large number of applicants for final graduation out of the Forest Grove and Hillsboro schools, but three passed, and the rest will have to again take the examination. As a matter of fact, this is humiliating to students. In the country districts, which contain a majority of the students, those who took the examination were generally successful, but this is easily explained when one finds out that only a very, very small per cent take the finals in the country districts. It begins to look as though there is a radical wrong somewhere in the course of study prescribed by the state board. Parents who take much pains with their children in school matters, and who strive hard to educate them up to an average standard, must feel out of sympathy with the system of averages which means failure for so large a per cent of the scholarship in the advanced grade. But, so long as the school book publishers get their hand in—or "hand out," and so long as those at the head of the state school system are satisfied, it is suspected that the voters are to take no notice of the condition of school affairs. It looks as though there is a studied attempt to raise citizens without mental independence. Of one thing there is certainty—either the school system is crowded, or else the questions prepared are altogether out of sympathy with the course taught.
