LABORER AND FARMER.

Union labor generally stood for the betterment of labor ideals in California. As a matter of fact, Lane received more votes than Pardee, and only defective votes gave Pardee the election. Livernash and Wynn succeed Kahn and Loud in the two congressional districts joining in San Francisco; and the labor unions of Sacramento made a seat for Bell, democrat, to succeed Coombs, a republican with a collar around his neck. Union labor gave W. R. Hearst the biggest majority a democrat ever received on the congressional ticket in a New York district. This is a force that must be considered in the next presidential election. Labor will attain its ideals only by voting as a unit. No other course will give labor prestige in national councils. The fear of the labor vote in the eastern congressional election forced Morgan to settle the coal strike or see his party defeated—and that meant the demolition of the trusts which he represents. In the past the labor vote has been divided, as has the farmer vote. In this division has laid the strength of capitalists, who have invariably stood together. Through labor unionism labor has forced itself to a respectful consideration. The farmers will eventually learn this lesson. Long has it been since the laborer and the farmer have been represented by legislation as classes. Things are changing.

NOTHING BUT A BLUFF.

The congressional elections give the opposition a gain in the House, and the republicans still retain power, although their majority is somewhat reduced. The republican loss is not much, take it all in all, but when one stops to consider that the president and all his cabinet were out to get votes to sustain the administration; when one stops to think that the ending of the strike (just as was done two years ago) came just before the election; when one stops to consider that the people were told that the administration was to proceed against the trusts by tariff revision, the republican victory is not particularly brilliant. It has been freely predicted that the talk of tariff revision, prior the election, was all a bluff, and, since the election has resulted in a republican house of representatives, we find the big lights in the party coming out and stating that there will be no tariff revision. So, it seems, all the talk of tariff revision and the control of trusts was pure buncombe. And, as a matter of fact, nothing will be done as to tariff on trust-made or any other kind of goods. There is too much money in trusts; and too many bankers own trust stock of all kinds, to expect a change. Just so long as the people select the ideas put forward by the Morgans and the Gages, just so long we shall have a government for the trusts. It will soon be all one trust anyway, managed by two or three directors, being not far from that at present—for Morgan manages the banking legislation; ends the coal strike; is at the head of the railroad trusts; at the head of many manufacturing trusts, and the whole thing generally. He simply works the people because the people permit it—and will permit it until they get their eyes open. This time will not come until the last bluff has been worked.

Gov. GEER has decided that he will call no extra session. It will now be in order to abuse the man from Waldo Hills. Once upon a time, when he thought of calling an extra session, it was up to the Portland people to impugn his mo-

call the legislature together before the regular session, it will be in order for the Portland powers that be to again call attention to the fact that there is a "nigger in the woodpile."

The Hon. John Minto doesn't like it because The Argus wants the coyote bounty law repealed. That's no news. Your Uncle John will swear by any law that was ever passed, or that will ever be passed, to his knowledge, by a republican legislature.

WHEN Geer first contemplated an extra session to place the newly elected state officials on a flat salary, Portlanders of the Matthews ring kicked most righteously, and said it was all a play by the governor to make him senatorial votes. This was not true, as Geer knew he couldn't get any more votes than he had at the close of the campaign. Later on Portland wanted an extra session that an appropriation might be considered. Mr. Geer has changed his mind and says that the state can wait. And so, forsooth, the pure and loving political saints down in Multnomah wailth.
