WHY NOT AT HILLSBORO?

Some people never see the eternal fitness of things until it is too late to get the calf in the corral. Here is Hillsboro. The town was through with the nursing bottle, and wearing its first pair of boots long before Portland was anything but a landing place for Indian canoes. Hillsboro was the county seat of what is now Multnomah county, and the first prominent mark of Lewis & Clarkism outside of Oregon City—and Oregon City never did count for anything except that it had a water-fall. To properly settle upon a site, the Lewis & Clark committee should have had a hunch from The Argus that this was the earliest seat of civilization; that here we had the oldest court house in a state of preservation in the state; that here we have the first power newspaper press brought to Oregon; that here we have old pioneers with more moss on their backs than would thatch the Oregonian building; but why enumerate all these things when "we all" slept while the committee was considering sites. This inertia makes one ill. If Hillsboro doesn't wake up before long it will need the services of an undertaker—and no doubt the committee in charge of the funeral would go to Portland and patronize a Portland institution. Of course, Portland can't be blamed for asking for the fair when no competitors were in the field. But let it go out to the world that Hillsboro will give the Lewis & Clark exposition, without any appropriation from the state, if the Portland feature shall fall through.

Now that the elections are over the coal barons are much more bold than they were just before the votes were cast. And they talk just as though the charge that the board of arbitration to adjust the coal strike was selected by them was truthfully made.

NO SYMPATHY THERE.

It is not at all astonishing that President Eliot, of Harvard, should be out of sympathy with union labor. This big institution of learning is endowed with the money of millionaires, in the main, and its student body is not at all largely attended by the sons of toil. President Eliot is in touch with the coddled sons of wealth as a rule, and the poor boy who works his way through Harvard is as scarce as the rich young man working as laborer in the anthracite coal fields. It is a well known fact that the directorate of nearly all these big colleges were heartily in hatred of the democracy as represented in the national platforms of 1896 and 1900. As a rule nothing that bears other than the stamp of a money aristocracy can get the indorsement of either Harvard or Yale. Labor must not expect to get the sympathy and support of a class that utterly fails to comprehend the worth or the dignity of labor. It is expected that men like Eliot will always look to the very worst element of labor as a criterion by which to judge all efforts to place all labor upon a plane better for wage earners generally. The world is finding out that sympathy from corporation college presidents is as much of a rarity as democracy in corporation attorneys.

There is something touching in the fact that people will grow just because the government has to pay for a special train that the president may go down to Alabama to get a shot at a black bear, and that after all the expense and national anxiety no bear was kind enough to get in range of the presidential gun. Southern bears will now be classified as unferried and as too

much democratic in that they will not get sociable with a republican executive. It would have been vastly cheaper to have bought some cinnamon bear from some Italian organ grinder, taken him (the bear, of course,) out on the Potomac somewhere, placed him in a pasture, and given Mr. Roosevelt a shot at him. But the American people like to do things on a large scale, and if they are bughouse enough to stand for a special train to haul home a bear that was never killed, it simply goes to show that asylums are superfluous. Let the bear hunt proceed!
