DAVE ENYART NOW IN COUNTY JAIL

Arrested for Alleged Larceny of Horse.

HAS SERVED TIME IN THE PEN.

State Alleges That he Stole Cayuse From Will Jones.

D. E. Enyart, aged about forty years, has been arrested for the alleged larceny of a horse. The animal was stolen about two weeks or more ago, and belonged to William Jones, a son of John Jones, formerly of Glencoe. Enyart went from the Glencoe section to Portland, and from there down to a wood camp on the Columbia, near Scappoose. Sheriff Sewell and C. W. Redmond picked him up down there Monday morning, and found him asleep in under some straw in a barn. Enyart says that he is insulted because a Portland paper stated that he was a half-breed Indian. His father is an old time pioneer, coming here in the early fifties. He was bound over in the sum of \$250, and, in default of bail is in limbo in the county jail.

The outstanding Hillsboro city warrants, general fund, November 19, 1901, amounted to \$6,286.58. The outstanding warrant debt, Nov. 19, 1902, is \$5,054.11, leaving a reduction of the floating debt in the sum of \$1,232.47. The water and light fund warrants, Nov. 18, 1901, amounted to \$2,272.83. Nov. 18, 1902, this account has increased to \$2,781.50, this increase being due to supplies which are now on hand. The cash receipts of the water and light plant for the fourteen months was \$5,025.38. The total cash received for the year ended, from taxation and license, amounts to \$3,505.33, making gross receipts for the city, \$5,530.71. The reports of the various officers will be made public in a few days.

That was a rare tribute paid by the late Deacon Alexander to his old friend and neighbor T. G. Todd when he appointed him his executor and requested that he be allowed to serve without giving bond. One of the large estates of the county and the interests of many heirs are involved, but Mr. Alexander, while a careful and prudent business man, had so much confidence in his friend that he was willing to trust all to him with no other security than the knowledge of his upright and honorable life. Such evidence of confidence are rare and when shown they are most creditable both to the dead and to the living in whom he placed such trust.—Forest Grove Times.
