THE panic which struck Wall Street after the elections would have been charged up to the democrats had that party carried the lower house. Of this there is no doubt in the light of past history. And yet, we find nothing said about the loss of millions. It seems to matter a little, after all, whose ox is gored.

THE Astorian is out in a lengthy editorial supporting Hon. C. W. Fulton for the United States senate. It ascribes great fitness and qualifications, and says that Fulton will do very much for Portland. The Forest Grove Times is out for Hon. T. H. Tongue to wear the robes of that splendid office. Geer has his supporters, and his men may hold the balance of power. Scott, of the Oregonian, is said to have some legislators behind him, and it begins to look as though we shall have a merry time up at Salem this winter. It would not surprise anyone if there should be a deadlock at the capitol, unless the democrats and populists again take a hand and end the contest.

CONGRESS will soon be in session, and the people will soon learn whether we are to have legislation that will mean business as to suppressing the trusts.
