

MACHINERY FOR FACTORY HERE

Condensed Milk Factory Outfit Arrived Monday.

HAULED TO CREAMERY BUILDING
Will be installed at Once. Running in Two Weeks.

Washington county will soon start the first condensed milk factory in the state of Oregon, and Hillsboro capital has furnished the impetus.

The machinery for the condensing plant of the Oregon Condensed Milk Company, of which Dr. J. P. Tamsie is president, arrived in the city Monday morning, and was taken out to the Glencoe creamery building that afternoon. The expert who is to set up the plant, arrived Wednesday and is now engaged in putting the machinery into place. It is thought that the condenser will be at work within a few weeks. The machinery looks fine and shows evidence of careful workmanship. Dr. Tamsie will put over one hundred cows on his own ranch north of town, and will gradually increase the herd as fast as the place can be made to sustain so much stock. He will pay cash for milk, and the location is an excellent one. The old creamery building will be used. Dr. Tamsie has purchased his engine and boiler here, and as soon as he can get the plant ready to start, he will be ready to start in all details. He has his own and labels on the ground, and nothing but the machinery in place is needed to start the fire.

MRS. LETITIA ADKINS.

Mrs. Letitia Knox Adkins, wife of Dr. J. E. Adkins, died at Spokane, November 20, 1902, from tubercular trouble. Mrs. Adkins was born in Fern Ridge, Lane county, Oregon, November 21, 1857, and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. W. Miller, the father surviving the daughter. May 19, 1875, she was married to Thos. Stewart, Jr., and of this union three boys survive: G. Ernest Stewart, now with a big mining company at Trail, B. C.; Jesse Stewart, in the mercantile business at North Yakima, Wash.; and Frank Stewart, of the Portland mail carrier service. Deceased was married to Dr. J. E. Adkins, October 9, 1898. For some months she had travelled in Washington and British Columbia for her health, and was returning to Oregon when death overtook her. She was a member of the Christian church of this city. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon, interment being in the Hillsboro cemetery.
