

ENYART FOUND GUILTY OF HORSE STEALING

Chain of Evidence was Complete in Conviction.

ATTORNEYS NEARLY COME TO BLOWS

Lawyers Bump and Tongue Mix and are Fined \$10 Each.

David Enyart, a native of north of Hillsboro, was last Saturday found guilty of larceny of a horse belonging to Wm. Jones, of Glencoe. Jones testified that the horse was taken Sunday eve, November 9th; Enyart was seen by a German boy, near Phillips, that Sunday, about noon; Cash, a negro of good repute, living near Lenox, had given Enyart his dinner; he had left Cash's place about 4:30 going towards Glencoe. He was seen after leaving Cash, by Wm. Jones, who testified that he talked to Dave. The next morning by daylight the mare had been taken into Clackamas county, and Dave Enyart sold her to a Mrs. Dittmer, a sister to the Nick Anderson who killed Tooley, on the Holbrook road beyond Bethany, last spring. Enyart said on the stand that he had traded for the mare, but, beyond saying the man's name was Morgan, refused to say when the deal took place. The jury was out five minutes and found Enyart guilty as charged in the information. During the argument before the jury Mr. Bump, Enyart's attorney, said that the district attorney's office had manufactured evidence, and to this E. B. Tongue demurred, giving Bump the lie. Bump removed his glasses and started for Tongue, who arose to meet him. Some one stepped in between before either had struck a blow. Judge McBride fined each ten dollars and ordered that they stand committed until it was paid. The money was soon handed over and order restored. Enyart was sentenced to 8 years at Salem.

James Aiken, convicted of murdering the Raleigh Chinaman and sentenced for life a year ago, is again upon trial, the supreme court having decided that the court erred in admitting certain testimony prejudicial to the defense. Tongue and Judge O'Day, of Portland. The argument of the attorneys, from a forensic point, was admirable, and listened to by a crowded court room.
