ASIDE from politics it will be a long time before the First District of Oregon will have so able a Representative as was the late Hon. T. H. Tongue. He was a tireless worker; he had a life identification with Oregon. He knew the state's needs, and, knowing them, worked for them untiringly. This is a matter of history. Mr. Tongue never yet had an enemy who would not admit his brilliancy and his untiring devotion to work, and hard work, at that. He was a bundle of nerves and work, and his best epitaph would be, "Here Rests One Who Never Resigned."

THE only thing now in the way of realization of the electric line between this place and Portland is the uncertainty of the franchise granted the company through the streets of Portland. The money is pledged for the purchase of the bonds just as soon as the franchise shall be made bona fide. It is extremely unfortunate for Portland and the development of the surrounding territory that there is always so much obstruction to public enterprise. A man is afraid a car-line in front of his house would hurt his valuations—and this, in the face of the fact that there is not an electric line in Portland but what has made more valuable all property adjacent to its tracks. Portland should be more public spirited. Portland needs this line, the country needs it, and the money is ready to build. It is senseless to threaten forward and backward, and a sheer loss of time. Closer communication is needed. Every man of prominence in Portland should see to it that capital is not slapped in the face every time it pulls its card to make a business call. Washington county citizens granted every foot of the right of way. Part of Portland yet childishly prates against a franchise—isn't it about time that this knocking ceased, and that an endeavor be made to cement sense and enterprise? Let us lay down our sledges and take up this matter in a manner indicative of business, acknowledging that Washington county wants closer relations with Portland, and that Portland has the spirit to see it.

THE death of the little Dilley boy has its moral. Parents around Hillsboro should bear in mind that while children will be children, a railroad track is a bad place for a little chap to use as a play ground. Every day there are young boys at the station when cars are switching. The agent can not send them away, for discipline is unknown to the most of them. Teach your children that carelessness in this regard oftentimes has its penalty.
