

FEE BILL BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE

Laws Wanted That Will Raise Costs of Law Suits.

SOME OPPOSITION TO THE BILL.

Proposed Raise of Salary for County Officials Crushed.

The Washington county delegation has been asked to present a bill raising the costs of litigation; where five hundred dollars is demanded the bill asks for \$5 fees; where not less than \$500 and up to \$2,500, \$7.50 fees is demanded; from \$2,500 on to \$5,000, \$10 is asked; and where the prayer is over \$5,000, a fee of \$15 is asked.

The proposal to add \$900 for deputy and clerical aid to the clerk's salary, making a total of \$3,300; the same to the sheriff, and \$2,000 for the recorder's office, instead of \$1,500; \$1,730 for the assessor, instead of \$930; \$800 for the county judge, instead of \$600; \$900 for the treasurer, instead of \$700, will no doubt be smothered. All of the offices are burdened with much more work than formerly. The clerk's office is badly in need of help, and the work is much more onerous than for years, while the law leaves Sheriff Sewell and Clerk Morgan with very little salary for the extra help; the recorder has more work than formerly, and Assessor Wilcox earns at least \$150 per month.

While the taxpayers would no doubt kick against a raise on general principles, one who knows what is to be done in the various offices, will wager that any taxpayer who pays sufficient to warrant a kick, would not leave his business to take some of the offices in question as a gift.

The bill will not likely turn up again, but, as a matter of fact, as county business increases there will again come the question of compensation. Any man who will look into the volume of work to be done, will at once agree that several of the offices are not sufficiently paid, and he will not go into hysterics over a possible raise.

The fee bill should be passed by all means—but will it? It would bring in from \$2,000 to \$3,000 annually that the tax payers now "dig up."

FRED MATTHIES.

Fred Matthies, a highly respected business man and merchant of Cornelius, died at his home in that city, Friday evening, January 30, 1903, after a short illness. Deceased had conducted a general merchandise store in that city for several years, and was esteemed by all who knew him. The funeral occurred Sunday, the German Lutheran minister, of Blooming, officiating, first in German and then in English. He leaves a wife and eight children to mourn his loss.

Deceased was born in Wittenberg, Germany, in 1856, and came to Oregon eight years ago. He and Mrs. Matthies were married eleven years ago.
