FOUR OR FIVE THOUSAND POUNDS.

Portland Buyers Present. Did not feel Commercial.

ALMIRA WHEELER IRELAND.

Mrs. Almira Wheeler Ireland died at Oakland, Cal., recently. She was born in Lacona, Indiana, Oct. 13, 1818, and was married to John Ireland, Aug. 24, 1838. They moved from Indiana to Iowa in 1851 and ten years later started to Oregon across the plains. The husband and a little girl died while crossing the plains. In 1861 she settled on a farm north of Hillsboro, and, until 1871, resided in the vicinity of this place. At that time she moved to Portland, and, in 1891, went to California to reside, where she died April 18, 1903. Deceased remained a widow until death. Five children survive: V. Ireland, Gray's Harbor, William, Santa Clara, Cal., Mrs. John Murphy and Miss Clara Ireland, Oakland, Cal., and Geo. Ireland, for several years a resident of this city. Interment took place at Santa Clara.

DANIEL HUTCHISON

Daniel Hutchison, who died at the St. Vincent Hospital, April 14, 1903, of paralysis, was born in Holmes county, Ohio, May 4, 1827, and emigrated with his parents to Iowa in 1847, where he married Miss Margaret Gilliland in Jefferson county, July 4, 1850. On August 2, 1852 he enlisted in Co. I 33rd Iowa Volunteers and was honorably discharged after the term of his enlistment. After the war he settled in Kansas, and in 1886 came to Oregon, settling near Glencoe, where he has resided continuously. Since 1893 he has suffered from a paralytic stroke, and has been a patient sufferer ever since. He belonged to the United Brethren Church. He leaves an aged wife, two daughters and five sons living in different parts of Oregon. The interment was in the Arcadia cemetery.

Bagley has now filed a replevin suit against Brown, and the question of possession will be threshed out before Justice of the Peace H. T. Bagley. The hall rack is now in the possession of Brown, but was given to Hiatt by the Circuit Court, and is valued at \$75, or somewhere near that figure. The jury above at one time voted five for conviction and one for acquittal, so it is said, on good authority.

AGREE TO SALE OF
HILLSBORO FRANCHISE

The Portland Council Wants \$25,000 for Privilege.

GRAYDON AGREES TO THIS SUM.

Franchise will be Granted Soon Unless all Signs Fail.

It begins to now look as though a franchise will be granted to the Hillsboro electric line. The city has agreed to grant a franchise on the streets last named and stand between the company and the other now having a franchise on Northrup, if the proposed line will pay the city \$25,000. To this the promoters have agreed, and it begins to look like business. The city takes the position that if the line now doing business on the street wants to go into court rather than amicably come to some agreement that the proposed road shall have another street. Mr. Graydon is now in New York. His people now have a man on the way to look over the grades and look into the territory through which the road will pass, the probable business of the new road, and the promoters think that by the middle of the summer we will know whether we are to have that road or not.
