## UNIVERSALLY DESIRED IN TOWN

Promoters are calculating to utilize Springs.

It begins to look good for the prospects of the big condensed milk factory being located in Hillsboro. The committee consisting of J. W. Shute, James H. Sewell and Ed Schulmerich, have looked over all the ground between Dairy Creek and Rock Creek, and have examined the various springs in South Hillsboro. The promoters believe that they can get a bountiful supply of water at these springs and wells will be sunk at once. Unanimous sentiment is for the big plant to be located in this city, and every endeavor will be made to have the site located near the Southern Pacific station.

J. W. Shute states that he is willing to spend \$100 on the springs just to satisfy himself that water enough can be obtained, and as he is one of the stock holders in the new company his word is considered more or less authoritative.

## JAMES G. LEE AGAIN IN TROUBLE

Landed in County Jail Accused of Larceny.

## ABSENT FROM HOME SINCE FALL.

Authorities charge him with stealing and selling a calf.

James G. Lee, once the owner of several hundred acres of land up in the Patton Valley, the substance of which he has squandered in fighting lawsuits both civil and criminal in nature, is again in the toils of the law. One Benjamin Dennis, who lives above the Lee place, lost a calf last November. He tracked the matter to Portland, finding the hide where it had been sold. The officers were apprised of the fact and the District Attorney filed an information. Lee skipped the country and has been absent ever since—some say up in British Columbia. The authorities think they have a clear case against the defendant, and it looks bad for the man who has been so many times a familiar figure at a term of the Washington County circuit court. Lee has fled his bond, but it is not yet approved. He stated to an Argus reporter that the charge against him was not worrying him, as he was not guilty, and he gave the impression that his enemies were at the bottom of the legal proceedings.
