Considerable care, however, must be exercised in the auditing of these claims, and a reasonable time should be allowed the Department in which to make the necessary examinations and payment thereof."

FOREST GROVE WILL VOTE ON SALOONS

The People Decide by an Election, July 1.

A SPIRITED FIGHT IS EXPECTED.

Council Met This Week, and Voted to Decide by Popular Vote.

Forest Grove is to vote on the saloon question on July 1. The city council met this week, and to get the matter settled for once and all, decided to give the people a chance to decide whether or not they want a licensed saloon inside the city limits. The matter has been fought over and over for many years, and those who favor saloon license say that there are several places in the town where the "thirst" may be quenched, and that a saloon would be conducive of more order, better police regulations, and would tend to a better town, morally.

It is expected that the affirmative will carry by a considerable majority, and, if it shall, the license will be granted and the city bear the brunt of any legal fight which may follow.

PHILIP BEAL DEAD.

Philip Beal, a pioneer of 1847, died at Forest Grove, Wednesday, June 10. Deceased was born in Indiana, March 4, 1835. He moved to Missouri when only 5 years old, where he resided for five years, then came to Washington county and located on a farm north of Forest Grove, where he had resided since, with the exception of the past 12 years, which has been spent at Forest Grove.

Mr. Beal finished his education at Tualatin Academy of Pacific University, under Dr. S. H. Marsh, Cushing Falls and other pioneer teachers. He married Miss Clara Noland, March 6, 1862, who survives him. He had 11 children, three of whom are living: Susie, wife of Frank Watters; John and Orrell Beal, all of Forest Grove.

Mr. Beal was a charter member of Holbrook Lodge, No. 30, A. F. & A. M., also a charter member of Washington Lodge, No. 48, I. O. O. F., under whose auspices the funeral was held this afternoon, and interment was in the Buxton cemetery.

The Knights of Pythias from Yamhill and Washington counties, with a considerable number from Multnomah, and Grand Chancellor J. W. Maloney, of Pendleton; Past Grand Chancellor Judge Bradshaw, of The Dalles; Col. Will Rapson, on Gen. Carnahan's staff; and various other officers of the regiment and battalion, held forth in Hillsboro last Friday, and one of the best times ever held by a fraternal organization was enjoyed by over 150 knights.

Four companies drilled for the prize—a beautiful banner. This fell to McMinnville. Hillsboro took the percentage of membership prize. The drill exercises were held in the courtyard in the afternoon, Capt. F. J. Bailey acting as judge. To Major L. M. Hoyt of this city, is due the success of the first encampment.

In the evening the subordinate lodges met in the Odd Fellows' hall and entered competitive work—and there was an exhibition of ability that surprised the distinguished visitors. McMinnville carried off one individual prize, awarded Mr. Grissen; Forest Grove carried off an individual prize, awarded Mr. Leabo; Geo. Schuler, of this city, carried off a first prize, while Geo. R. Bagley and John M. Wall tied for first place on individual work. Phoenix Lodge carried away the prize offered for the best team in rank work.

CAN YOU VOTE?

Next Monday is school meeting day, and for the benefit of the many readers of the Argus, the law as to voters is herewith published:

Any citizen of this state, male or female, who is twenty-one years of age and has resided in the district thirty days immediately preceding the meeting or election and has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which he or she is liable or subject to pay a tax, shall be entitled to vote at any school meeting or election in said district. Provided, that, for the purposes of this section, any man who has declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, and has resided in the state for six months immediately preceding the meeting or election where he proposes to vote, shall be considered a citizen of this state.

Provided further, that any person shall be deemed to have complied with the property qualification imposed by this section who presents to the directors or judges of election satisfactory evidence that he or she has stock, shares, or ownership in any corporation, firm, or copartnership which has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which such corporation, firm, or copartnership pays a tax, even though his or her individual name does not appear upon the tax roll: Provided, further, that in districts of the third class, any head of a family who is otherwise a qualified elector, and having children of school age, may vote at such election without property qualifications. The chairman of any school meeting, or any qualified elector, is hereby authorized to challenge any person who may offer to vote at such meeting. In case an elector has been challenged as disqualified, it shall be the duty of the chairman of such meeting to administer to each person so challenged an oath that he or she will truly answer all questions propounded to him touching his place of residence and qualifications as elector at such meeting, and upon taking which, if the meeting be in a district of the first or second class, he shall interrogate him respecting his citizenship in this state, his age, residence in the district immediately preceding the meeting or election, and whether he has property or shares in a corporation in the district, as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which he or she is liable or subject to pay a tax; and if the meeting be in a district of the third class he shall interrogate him as to whether he is a head of a family and otherwise an elector, and has children of school age in the district.
