It is not well to take snap judgment against President Roosevelt in the matter of the postal frauds now alleged to be under investigation. Well will it be to await the final outcome of the inquiry. Certain it is that there is evidence of much fraud and wastage of public money—money given for service that never was performed, and wanton expenditure for things of no value. These sins against the public could not have been accomplished unless the heads of the postal department knew it—that is to say, if the heads knew what their subordinates were doing. If the real head did know these things and did not put a stop to it, which was not done, then that head should be removed; if that head did not know it, then it follows that there was unworthiness in control because of incompetency. It will be well to see whether or not the head of the postal department shall be pushed out of the honor and emolument before judgment is finally passed. The big fellows must suffer as well as the little fellows.

The Iowa republicans have appeased both the revisionists and those who are afraid of hurting the feelings of the trusts who are beneficiaries of an extreme tariff. This is a compromise of the meanest nature—a compromise of principle that should not merit success. But, as a matter of fact, the democrats of that state have effected just such a compromise, and the voters of the state will, no doubt, take but little interest in the coming election. When practical politicians rule both parties the people are generally left to hold the sack. That man who worries about the election in Iowa is wasting a whole lot of nervous force without hope of results, whatever party may win.

#### KERMIS AT VERBOORT.

A series of amusements will be given at Verboort, beginning July 2nd and ending July 5th. On Thursday, July 2, the Church celebrates the Feast of Visitation of

the Blessed Virgin. On that day a Solemn High Mass, with Deacon and Sub-Deacon, will be celebrated with all the pomp and dignity of the Catholic Ritual. An appropriate sermon for the occasion will be delivered by one of the visiting clergy. At 2 p. m. the various amusements will commence—such as races, climbing greased pole, dancing, etc. On the 3rd, a Farmers' Congress will be held, and Dr. James Withycombe, Vice-Director of the Corvallis Agricultural College, will lecture on farm and dairy topics. No unbefitting conduct will be tolerated, and men invested with authority of law will keep order. At 8 o'clock every evening the curfew will notify the close of festivities for the day, and be notice to vacate the grounds.

#### THE CHATAUQUA AT GLADSTONE PARK.

The Willamette Valley Chautauqua Association has issued its tenth annual program. From the very small beginning in the way of a session held in 1894, the Chautauqua has grown until it covers a period of thirteen days and draws talent for its platform from all parts of the country.
