

SENATOR WEHRUNG RECIPIENT OF HONORS

Was Appointed by Lewis & Clark Board, Saturday.

TO SUPERINTEND OREGON EXHIBIT

To be Sent to St. Louis World's Fair Next Year.

Senator W. H. Wehrung, of this city, was last Saturday appointed by the Lewis & Clark Board of Directors to superintend the Oregon exhibit, which will be sent to the St. Louis Exposition. The choice was the unanimous selection of the Board, and the honor is not an empty one.

Mr. Wehrung's executive ability commended him to the Lewis & Clark people, and his energy and ability displayed as President of State Board of Agriculture did much in the way of causing the appointment. The news came to Mr. Wehrung as a complete surprise, and he was somewhat undecided as to whether or not he would accept.

Mr. Wehrung is the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Wehrung, old pioneers of Washington county. He was born in Hillsboro, March 22, 1861. For many years he has managed the mercantile establishment of H. Wehrung & Sons, and his business ability is conceded by all who have known him. He was appointed on the Board of Agriculture by Gov. Geer, and his energetic manner in handling the business of that institution gave him the presidency. He has brought the State Fair out of disrepute, and made it a financial and industrial success. Three years ago he was elected state senator, and has served two sessions.

His many friends congratulate him upon his selection, and that he will fill the place with credit to himself and to the state goes without saying.
