Another season like the one just closing will make the sawmill man rich or wear out the patience of builders. Every mill in this section has been running full capacity and yet all are behind in their orders. No relief can be had from Portland mills so builders have to take their medicine. As a matter of fact the mills have not paid the best profit except during the past two or three years—but they are putting away deposits these times.

The Hillsboro mills are paying 75 cents for wheat today—the Portland market being from 75 to 78 cents. The reason of this is made clear when it is known that wheat raising is a small industry in this section. Mills which desire to run are therefore paying the top of the market to save freights from Portland or up-the-valley points. If the acreage of this grain continues to shrink it will not be long until we will have to import for bread purposes.

Sylvester Vaughn, to whom Judge McBride awarded the property recently burned on the corner of First and Lincoln, and then occupied by Mrs. Gishwiller now in jail, died at Seattle in July, and his estate is now being probated upon by the county court.
