

BURKE BROUGHT BACK BALL IN HIS BODY

Shot by Vancouver Sheriff While Trying to Escape.

NOW LODGED IN HILLSBORO JAIL.

Sheriff Sewell Brings Him Home Last Sunday.

J. H. Burke, the escaped forger, was caught by Sheriff Biesack of Vancouver, late last Saturday night. Burke was caught at the house of his brother, Hamlin by name, six miles north of Vancouver. The fugitive was in a room talking to his brother, when the sheriff went to a window, pulled aside a curtain, and levelled a gun at the forger. Burke made a rush for the door. The sheriff fired twice, one shot taking effect in the rear of the hip, passing on through into the groin where the ball now resides. The other was a flesh wound in his right arm. Burke was met at the door of the cabin and was soon

made a prisoner. He was taken to Vancouver, and Sheriff Sewell, who was expecting news of a capture any minute, went to Clark county and had the man brought out Sunday, in a coupe. Drs. Linklater and F. J. Bailey are attending the wounded man.

Burke says that he did not have a fight with the deputy of Skamania county, and that he only grabbed the officer's old, useless and unloaded revolver and made for the brush. He said that he would not have gone to his brother only that he learned that he knew he was the man whom the officers were after.

Burke is resting easy, is taking nourishment and seems well on the road to recovery. The bullet still remains lodged in the groin and no attempt will be made to extract the missile. Burke expects his wife to arrive any day. He refuses to tell where his mother lives, stating that he did not wish her to learn he had gone wrong.

Grandma Wood, of Hillsboro, 116 Years Old.

FAMILY BIBLE FOUND IN MISSOURI

Horseback Across the Plains. Resides With Daughter, a Girl of 70.

The Ramsay family bible has been located in Missouri, and this gives the exact date of Mary Ramsay Wood's birth. She was born in Knoxville, Tenn., May 20, 1787, and was a daughter of Richard Ramsay, the first brick-maker of that historic city. This makes her age 116 years, 4 months and 12 days. Mrs. Woods crossed the plains in 1853, and was then a youth of 66 years, and made most of the way on horseback. She and her husband kept one of the first



hotels in Hillsboro. Despite her extreme age, she promises to yet live a long time her health being fairly good. She resides with her daughter, Mrs. C. B. Reynolds, a woman now in the prime of 73 years. They live on Main street, just east one door of the Chenette flow, and opposite the entrance of the south court house door.
