

KENNEDY BOUND TO
MAKE APPEARANCEMust Answer to the Circuit
Court.

DEFENSE OFFERED NO EVIDENCE

Chief Witness for Kennedy Said to be
in the East.

The examination of R. H. Kennedy, charged with burglarizing the Warren residence early in September, was concluded last Saturday before Justice Bagley. The hearing was held in the circuit court room and there was a large crowd in attendance. After the state had examined a few witnesses, the defense offered no evidence, and Mr. Kennedy was held to answer at the next term of circuit court.

Miss Minnie Warren testified that she believed Mr. Kennedy to be the burglar, and that, beyond any reasonable doubt. She judged from his general appearance, his voice and his stature. She related the story of the terrible experience, told how she was awakened by a scream coming from Mrs. B. F. Mackinder's room about two in the morning; how she went in and struck a match; how she discovered the presence of the intruder; then going to call her father; how they went upstairs together and were covered by the revolver of the burglar; how he robbed Mrs. Mackinder of cash, watch and rings and of how she and her guest made their escape, the witness going into the orchard and Mrs. Mackinder to Mr. Talbot's, toward town. She related that as soon as she went to the house, in response to a call from her father, she told him the burglar was Kennedy and that she and Mrs. Mackinder both agreed without any preliminary comparison of notes that the man was Kennedy. She told of so disarranging the mark of the intruder that he was forced to step aside and adjust it and how he said to her, "Darn you," and then she related that she had called him a coward, later on.

Justice Bagley fixed Kennedy's bond, Tuesday, at one thousand dollars and he filed his bail with the same sureties that went on his bond for appearance at examination, with nine Forest Grove people and one Hillsboro party, signing with the exception that F. T. Kane signs in place of E. W. Haines; J. A. Abbott in place of J. W. Cornelius, and J. E. Dugan in place of T. H. Adams.

Jackson made his quarterly report, Oct. 1, and it shows the following: Balance cash on hand, \$43,052.24; with balances of various funds: General fund, \$24,854.35; county school fund, \$15,870.31; District school fund, \$790.47; Beaverton, \$7.66; Institute fund, \$327.30; Excess, \$13,70. Indigent Soldiers, \$519.17; public road fund, \$669.28. The state tax has been paid, and, in a few days, County Supt. Ball will apportion the over fifteen thousand dollars in the school fund to the various districts of the county. This is a showing that no other county in the state can make!

He has a brother, Nels Johnson, who manages the Spring Hill Farm between Dilley and Gaston. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson allege that the holdup was effected because they were in need of money. She states that she knew her husband's intentions, as he told her what he was going to do after they had left their lodgings. Johnson has already pleaded guilty to the charge against him, before Judge Cleland, of the Multnomah circuit court.

FRED SCHULENBERG
KILLED AT BLOOMINGAttacked by Vicious Durham
Bull and Gored Death.

HE LEAVES A WIFE AND FAMILY.

Was Born in Germany in 1864. Came to Oregon in 1899.

Fred Schulenberg, a prosperous German farmer residing on the Benson farm, south of Cornelius, was killed by a vicious bull Friday morning last. The animal had torn down some fences and Schulenberg was attempting to drive him away when the infuriated animal bore him to the ground, crushing his chest and driving a rib into one of his lungs. The united efforts of two or three men who were nearby could not rescue the farmer. Deceased was a half-brother to Gerhardt and F. Goetze. He leaves a wife and three children, Martha, Emma and Henry, to mourn his loss. The funeral occurred Sunday and interment was in the Blooming cemetery.

The two young sons of John Koch, and F. Goetze, who saw the accident from a distance, tried to reach the place in time to save the unfortunate man but arrived too late.
