A MENACE TO INDUSTRY.

The cry of the big financial corporations and their followers, that we are about to have a panic in inexplicable upon any rational grounds of logic. The corporations control our congress and our legislation and they get just such laws as they want. That some of the laws they try are boomerangs goes without saying, but they are the real lawmakers, nevertheless. Just why, with a prosperous country in front of them, they should try, at this time, to force a panic, can have but one explanation, and that is to throw the country to a gold basis entirely. Is the game worth the candle? Is it worth while in order to gratify the desire of the Morgans to take a paltry silver dollar or so and cash it into gold, to cause unlimited sufferings in the circles of the poor? A panic will not hurt the Western farmer like it will the great commercial and laboring centers of the East, but it will injure him to some extent. The whole scheme seems to be a cheap subterfuge to commit the country to financial legislation that will insure, eventually, to the credit companies.

Their prophecies are a menace to industry, and while there is yet time for the people to take affairs into their own hands and protect themselves against this ruination every few years, something should be done to retire these fellows from influence in our law-making bodies. What we need is an Andrew Jackson or an Abraham Lincoln. The people should be fired to death of the calamity croakers for a pur-

The County Board of Health is complaining that the physicians of the county are not strict in sending in deaths, births and contagious diseases. The law is very strict in this regard, and all these should be reported. An examination of the books shows but 14 births reported for the month just ended, and The Argus has reported more births than this, in its news columns.

The carpenters are now done with the foundation of the condensed milk factory and are pushing the work as rapidly as the Johnson mill can deliver the lumber. The big well has been completed and holds all the way from 75,000 to 100,000 gallons of water, with a splendid flow, giving all that is necessary for manufacturing and cooling purposes. The Company is in a hurry to get the building enclosed before the bad weather begins.

The groom is the well known son of Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Bridges, formerly of Hillsboro, and now residents of Portland.

Justice H. T.
