

## PROBABLY WAS THE NEWBERG ROBBERS

### Three Men Steal Horse and Buggy.

#### RIDE TO 5 MILES FROM PORTLAND.

Probably Laid in Chehalis Woods All Day Monday.

Dan B. Emerick was up from Scholls yesterday and says that Monday night three men went to the barn of A. B. Brown, who resides about one and one-half miles from Scholls bridge, hatched up Brown's horse and buggy, and drove to within five miles of Portland, where they unhitched the horse, put the harness in the buggy, and turned the animal loose, with the halter on. Herman Collier, who had been at the Scholls Odd Fellows' Lodge, saw the three men between ten and eleven Monday night, as he was going home. Mrs. Brown had heard the men early in the evening, and with her son, had gone to the barn to investigate. They saw nothing wrong, and retired. Mr. Brown was at lodge and did not know that the horse and buggy was missing until next morning. The Newberg bank was entered between two and three o'clock Monday morning, and this leads to the idea that it might have been the Newberg marauders. More likely it was some local fellows who wanted to get to Portland at some one else's expense.

## BIG PETITION TO DISMISS GISHWILLER

### Attorney W. D. Smith Circulates and Many Sign.

#### WOMAN PROMISES TO LEAVE STATE

Many Signs Because They Think the Woman Was Not Responsible.

Hundreds of names adorn a petition which has been circulated by Attorney W. D. Smith, asking District Attorney Allen to dismiss the case of larceny against Mrs. Gishwiler, whose house burned last month and who secreted some household furniture under a chattel mortgage to a local firm in this city and then alleged it had gone up in smoke. The majority of the signers hold that the woman was not in her right mind, and that the work of that morning was the result of too much wine, combined with hysteria. The woman promises to leave the state, and the petition sets forth that the county will be saved considerable expense, and that the woman has already been confined sufficient to partly atone for her misdeeds. Her health is not the best, and it takes all the time of the husband to care for her. Very few people who were presented the petition refused to sign.

Cows are going cheaper than for some years with the sole exception of the winter milking cows, which are holding to former prices. At nearly all sales this fall the cow that is fresh gets a good round figure, while those not fresh until spring go at much lower prices than at corresponding periods heretofore. This is caused by the high prices of milk feed and hay.

Gaunt is known here, and was married to Miss Ollie McCamish, who, a year or so ago, committed suicide at McMinnville.
